Description

In the course East Asia in World Politics students will gain an in-depth knowledge of the international politics of this important region.

East Asia is today one of the most relevant regions in the world, both economically and politically. This vast and diverse region is home to the second and third largest economies in the world, China and Japan. In the last decades, it has become a global hub of finance, manufacturing and trade. However, contrasting with its economic dynamism, the region is also a hotspot of geopolitical tension and potentially destabilizing latent conflicts.

During the Cold War, East Asia was the scenario of superpower competition with myriad proxy wars fought in this theater. Today, despite having become an engine of the global economy, the sequels of the Cold War remain palpable throughout the region as several of its latent conflicts originated in that context: e.g. Taiwan, the Korean Peninsula... At the same time, with the rise of China, the region has undergone a major shift in the balance of power, whose outcome remains uncertain. This course will examine the main dynamics of conflict and cooperation in these two periods in order to understand the full complexity of the region today.

The course is divided into four activity-centered units:

Unit 1 will give us an **overview of the region** today and **introduce** some of the **relevant questions** that will be analyzed during the course. How do we define East Asia? Contending geopolitical delimitations of the region. Which changes has this region experienced in recent years? What are the main challenges facing this region today? What is the legacy of the Cold War in this region? To what extent is East Asia a cohesive region? In this unit, we will also review how the main theories of International Relations (IR), Realism, Liberalism, Constructivism, look at the international politics and security of this region.

Unit 2 is dedicated to analyzing the impact of the region's three major powers in shaping it: the US, China and Japan. The first part of the unit is dedicated to the United States. We will analyze Washington's preeminent role in East Asia, and the elements of consistency and disruption that have characterized the American policies and approach to this region from World War II until the Trump Administration. The second part of the unit is dedicated to China. We will analyze the impact China's rise for the region and, particularly, for China's relations with its regional neighbors, paying attention to Taiwan, Hong Kong, Japan and North Korea. We will also discuss the so-called 'Beijing Strategy' and the challenges this poses for the region as we know it. The third part of the unit is dedicated to Japan and its evolving role from what some have described a 'client state' of the US into a key politico-strategic partner for the US in the region. We will discuss how the Japanese foreign and security policies have been shaped by its so-called 'Peace Constitution' and whether, against the backdrop of a rapidly changing international environment, pacifism has given way to more proactive foreign policy postures in the island-nation.

Unit 3 will revolve around the challenges of **regionalism** and **regional security in East Asia**. First, we will look at the impact of transnational forces (**globalization**) in the region. We will discuss how the intensification of globalization has given place to different types of regionalism in the East Asian context and we will explore the complex relations of **interdependence** that link Northeast, Southeast and South Asia. Next, we will pay attention to the study case of ASEAN - the Association of South East Asian Nations. We will explore how this organization has become a hub around which a network of Asian regional organizations has emerged (the centrality of **ASEAN**). Finally, this unit will shift to issues concerning intra-regional security, with focus on the main flashpoints of tension in the region. We will analyze how the East Asian **security architecture** has been built through US-led bilateral 'hub-and-spokes' model, and the challenges it faces.

Unit 4 is a synthesis unit, organized around a **virtual debate**. In this unit we will put the contents of the course in perspective while maintaining an academic discussion about some of the most poignant international issues unfolding currently in that region.

The course as part of the programme as a whole

The Master's Degree in International Affairs and Diplomacy (UOC, UNITAR) is designed for diplomats and government officials involved in international affairs, as well as those persons involved in international relations or seeking a career in this field.

The course **East Asia in World Politics** provide the students with an in-depth knowledge of the dynamics of conflict and cooperation that occur in this important region of the world as well as the driving forces behind them. After completing this course, students will be able to critically analyze and discuss international issues unfolding in the region with observance of the strictest academic standards and methods.

No prior knowledge is required, although some familiarity with the East Asian region could be useful.

Objectives and competencies

The course East Asia in World Politics aims to help students:

- Gain a solid understanding of the challenges that the East Asian region faces today.
- Understand the role that the region's main powers have had in shaping the region as it is today.
- Distinguish the elements of continuation and rupture that exist between the East Asian region during the Cold War and the post-Cold War era.
- Be able to analyze critically the dynamics of conflict and cooperation that exist in the East Asian region.
- Develop the ability to present persuasive arguments on topics related to international affairs and public diplomacy unfolding in the region.
- Develop independent research and analytical skills.
