


# Disabled students at the UOC

Study conducted with 421 students

**86.20%**

are between 30 and 59 years old




**81.70%**

previously attended university

**90.74%**

have been studying at the UOC for at least a year, and 31.36% for more than 5 years

Current studies: Students are studying on a wide range of programmes:



A balance between men and women



A wide range of types of disability: more than 60% are medical and motor disabilities



**72.45%**

Most of the students have not had problems using the Virtual Campus



**29.63%**

have had to use specific software to study


**51.17%**

did not report having a disability because they did not need or did not want anything adapted

had a least one course adapted

**32.34%**



had the final exams adapted, and 20.90% highlighted the support received from the teaching staff

of those who received an adaptation of some kind considered it to be satisfactory

**75.77%**

had no problem keeping up with classmates

**85.56%**

of students were able to develop their studies and continuous assessment activities without having to drop out due to accessibility issues
