This is what accountability means: reporting on our internal achievements (from the inauguration of the new research building, as part of the development of our future single campus, to the progressive implementation of the Canvas classroom), on aspects of our public face, such as the Virtual Employment Fair, SpinUOC and the Alumni Symposium, and on the new challenges we have set ourselves, including our commitment to the new rural reality and to micro-credentials.

The annual report also connects us to the past. The UOC's founding mandate continues to permeate our daily lives. Although each new academic year is different, and while formats and

approaches develop and teams and ideas are renewed, there is one thing that always stays the same: we facilitate quality lifelong learning, adapted to the needs of citizens and attentive to the demands of society and industry, making technology our ally as part of our unique pedagogical model. This was exactly what I wanted to do when I took over in April from Dr Planell: to honour his legacy and imagine the UOC of tomorrow.

Because, of course, there is no time machine that does not include the future. On these pages, therefore, we set out the tasks that the UOC must undertake over the coming years. Some are already firm achievements that are helping us to position ourselves as a leading university; others are strategies that are now being rolled out or are still on the drawing board. All of them, however, are aligned to mobilize as much talent as possible, to ensure the university is in step with society, and to put technology at the service of

meaningful learning experiences. We want to be better, which means building on what already works and changing where there is room for improvement, with the necessary blend of pragmatism and idealism.

In other words, it is about creating the conditions to ensure that our future embraces concepts such as equity, sustainability, competitiveness, justice, critical thinking, employability, regional balance, and solidarity. All these concepts are given form in our day-to-day teaching, research and administrative work and, above all, are assimilated by the 113,500 graduates we have now... and those to come. Forgive the metaphor, but I see our main mission as providing the letters of the alphabet so each person can construct their own word, and all those words will enable them to write our future. Because at the UOC we believe that the future of the world is in our classrooms today.

Making our work more open

Over recent months the UOC has been rolling out the biggest cultural change in its history: an interdisciplinary, innovative form of organization that affects the university's entire workforce. A new model based on a clear commitment to an open working methodology that encourages staff to be flexible and independent and promotes their welfare.



UOC committed to new rural reality

The UOC has provided training to thousands of people living in areas at risk of depopulation and helped strengthen the economy and communities in these areas. Now the university aims to go further, with a new plan, the Rural UOC Network, which was presented on 15 September in an online session entitled "The new rural reality at the UOC: update and activation".

October 2022

In the latest *Times Higher Education* ranking of the world's best universities, **the UOC is among the top ten universities in Spain**. It has moved up in the overall ranking and is now in the 501-600 band of the 1,799 institutions included.



From 6 to 14 October, the rector, **Josep A. Planell**, travelled to Ecuador, Colombia and Uruguay to meet in person representatives of the governments and educational institutions with which the UOC has partnerships, as well as students and alumni.



Michael Murphy, a doctor by profession and President of the European University Association (EUA) since 2019, **opened the UOC's 2022/2023 academic year** with the inaugural lecture "Universities Without Walls – Adapting to Change in Europe".



On 28 October, the President of the Government of Catalonia, Pere Aragonès, and the Rector of the UOC, Josep A. Planell, inaugurated the UOC Interdisciplinary R&I Hub, the new 2,700 square-metre space given over entirely to research, innovation, knowledge transfer and entrepreneurship taking place at the university. They were accompanied by the Catalan Minister of Universities and Research, Joaquim Nadal, and the Vice Rector for Strategic Planning and Research of the UOC, Marta Aymerich, as well as a group of representatives of Barcelona City Council and various Catalan research organizations.



November 2022

We won the Urban Mobility Challenge!

The Urban Mobility Challenge is a competition between universities to encourage people to use sustainable means of transport, do sports and develop healthy habits, while raising awareness of the importance of environmental sustainability. We made the podium! We are the university community that ran the most kilometres: no fewer than 2,940, saving 714 kg in CO₂ emissions.



Affiliated to the Red Bench campaign

On 25 November, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, the UOC joined the international Red Bench campaign to raise awareness of gender-based violence. The aim of the project is to install red benches in public spaces with an awareness-raising phrase. The plaque on the bench on the UOC campus reads "Connectem-nos per una xarxa lliure de violències masclistes" (Connecting for a gender-violence-free network).

The UOC obtained the highest transparency seal

In recognition of its transparency portal, the UOC was awarded the Haz Foundation's T*** distinction, the highest level of its "T for Transparency" seal. This seal is based on indicators of the transparency and good governance of private universities, which must meet the criteria for visibility, accessibility, and up-to-date and complete information. The UOC achieved 100% of the indicators.

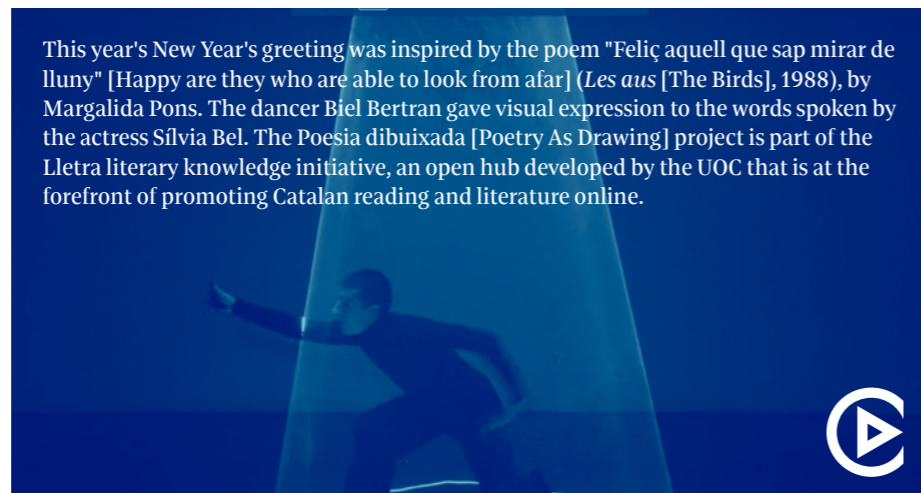


December 2022

The UOC hosted the Digital Universities Europe forum

From 23 to 25 October 2023, the UOC hosted the Digital Universities Europe forum on the Poblenou campus, organized by the *Times Higher Education* magazine, attended by around 250 specialists from all over Europe and some seventy speakers, with the theme "The road to digital, equitable and green higher education".

This year's New Year's greeting was inspired by the poem "Feliç aquell que sap mirar de lluny" [Happy are they who are able to look from afar] (*Les aus* [The Birds], 1988), by Margalida Pons. The dancer Biel Bertran gave visual expression to the words spoken by the actress Sílvia Bel. The Poesia dibuixada [Poetry As Drawing] project is part of the Lletra literary knowledge initiative, an open hub developed by the UOC that is at the forefront of promoting Catalan reading and literature online.



The Board of Trustees approved a budget of €160.9m for 2023, 4.1% higher than in 2022: €118.5m from enrolment fees; €31m from the programme agreement; €5.1m from research and innovation income (projects and knowledge transfer); €2m from UOC Corporate, and €4.4m from other revenue streams. The reduction in public university fees, four times higher energy costs and the increase in all other expenditures led to the need for adjustments to funding for investments and a budget for the year based on containing costs and maximizing efficiency.

More Canvas classrooms

The number of programmes using Canvas was set to double in the second semester of the academic year with the addition of four university master's degrees (and their associated content for other courses) and two UOC-certified master's degrees, involving an estimated 95 coordinating professors, 255 course instructors and 1,900 students. These programmes come on top of those taught using Canvas from October 2022.

New Coalition for Advancing Research Assessment formed

The International Coalition for Advancing Research Assessment (CoARA) was formed, with the UOC among its member organizations. The UOC has been working to change its research assessment model since 2019, when it signed the San Francisco Declaration. Now the university is part of this global initiative calling for qualitative research assessment, in line with the UOC's own Open Knowledge Action Plan.

New regulatory framework for lifelong learning

Following the entry into force of Royal Decree 822/2021, the university has approved a new academic organization framework. The aim is to define the UOC's course catalogue, establish internal criteria for academic governance and define the content of its educational products, covering both UOC-certified programmes and lifelong learning. This has resulted in the reorganization of the university's course catalogue.

Pau Casals Chair in Music and Peace

The Pau Casals Chair in Music and the Defence of Peace and Human Rights, founded in 2022 under an agreement between the UOC and the Pau Casals Foundation, launched its first call for applications for research grants with the mission of promoting research into and understanding of the musical and humanistic legacy of Pau Casals. These grants are not limited to research into the figure of Casals, but are also open to topics associated with the values championed by the musician throughout his life.

The UOC's founding rector, Gabriel Ferraté, donated his personal collection to the university's archives.

Highlights of the academic year

February 2023

Àngels Fitó put forward as the new rector of the UOC

The Board of Trustees of the Fundació per a la Universitat Oberta de Catalunya unanimously agreed to propose the appointment of Dr Àngels Fitó as the new rector of the UOC, following a selection process with a wide range of candidates. The holder of a PhD in Economics was at the time a senior professor at the UOC and had served at its Vice Rector for Competitiveness and Employability since 2019.



March 2023

Dame Wendy Hall, PhD in Mathematics and Regius Professor of Computer Science, was awarded an honorary doctorate by the UOC, in recognition of her academic career in the fields of Artificial Intelligence, the Semantic Web and Web Science, her inclusive vision of technology as a resource for people's well-being, and her leading role in the fight for gender equality and against horizontal segregation in the field of technology.



@AteneaAcademy is a new learning environment designed to transform the UOC's corporate education model using Canvas technology, facilitating the training and development of in-house talent. Between mid-2022 and early 2023, six pilot training courses were run. The feedback provided by the course participants helped to further develop and improve the environment. 557 participants took part in training in the @AteneaAcademy environment, 75% of whom completed the course, giving an average satisfaction score of 4.3 out of 5.



A single campus for the UOC

The Government of Catalonia, Barcelona City Council, the Institute of Photonic Sciences (ICFO) and the UOC signed an agreement to promote and facilitate knowledge and research in Catalonia. Barcelona Activa, the local economic development agency, moved out of the premises it occupied in the Can Jaumandreu building to give more space to the UOC, allowing the university to bring all its academic, research and management activities together on a single campus in the city's technology and knowledge district. At the same time, the building occupied by the UOC in the Castelldefels Mediterranean Technology Park was handed over to the ICFO, allowing it to expand its facilities.



Sharing knowledge in digital ecosystems

The UOC launched the Sharing Learning project to pool the knowledge and experience acquired over a history of almost thirty years, and to provide strategic and operational solutions for institutions facing the uncertainties or questions that typically arise during processes of change, improvement and reflection regarding digital formats and the use of technology in higher education.

Rector Planell bade farewell to the staff

More than 400 people gathered in the courtyard of the UOC Campus on 30 March to bid farewell to the outgoing rector, Josep A. Planell, at the conclusion of his term of office, after ten years at the helm of the university. In his speech, the rector emphasized the sense of pride and belonging he identified among members of staff immediately after taking up the post in 2013: "the UOC was a project that was full of life because it was a shared project," he commented, noting that "today, that pride of belonging that you had is mine as well. That's why I would like to thank you for the challenge of being rector of the UOC, for allowing me to be your rector."

April 2023

Àngels Fitó, new rector of the UOC

On 13 April, Àngels Fitó took office as the new rector of the UOC in a ceremony held in the auditorium of the Can Jaumandreu campus. Fitó pointed out that she has a "powerful triad" that will ensure the UOC has a strong future: "the project, the team and leadership". Over the following days, the new Executive Board was appointed, and the new organization and structure of vice-rectorates and deputy general managers was defined.

Micro-credentials, the future of higher education in Europe?

Castelldefels was the venue for the International Micro-credentials Summit, bringing together professionals, innovators, intellectuals and policymakers interested in improving the flexibility and responsiveness of education systems. As part of its wide-ranging programme, on Friday 24 March, the UOC hosted the National Symposium on Micro-Credentials, aimed at linking Spain's vibrant micro-credentials ecosystem to broader trends associated with the European approach to micro-credentials for lifelong learning and employability.

Interaction with students: 100% digital

In April, all interactions with students became fully digitalized, in line with the centralized digital multichannel strategy implemented by the Academic Services department. This completed the transition begun in 2022, a process that involved all the teams working in the areas of services, procedures and helplines.

UOC joined the European Laboratory for Learning and Intelligent Systems

Catalonia was named host of one of the four new units of the European Laboratory for Learning and Intelligent Systems (ELLIS), the pan-European artificial intelligence network of excellence that brings together the best researchers in the field. The new ELLIS Unit Barcelona, with the participation of the UOC, will be the third largest of the forty units in the network.

UOC Rural Awards

The UOC decided to hold the first UOC Rural Awards for bachelor's degree or master's degree final projects intended to help rural areas or solve challenges currently affecting the countryside. The aim of the UOC Rural Awards is to highlight academic solutions for rural issues and innovative ideas for strengthening ties between academia and the rural world.

May 2023



UOC strengthened its international presence

The UOC's indicators for international outlook increased twofold, and its indicators for research also rose, according to the 2023 CYD Ranking, which rates the performance of Spanish universities. The UOC obtained a total score of 36.

Research by the Smart Classroom Project group (created by the UOC and the University of Barcelona) led to the launch of a spin-off by the UOC's Research and Innovation department, through its Hubbik entrepreneurship platform, and the Bosch i Gimpera Foundation of the University of Barcelona. The company, a success story emerging from the field of social sciences and humanities, designs classroom spaces to meet new pedagogical needs, treating the space as such a vital part of change that it is often referred to as the *third teacher*.

The UOC ranked among the top 8% of universities in the world according to the CWUR, which also highlighted the quality of its teaching staff, research performance and the employability of the university's alumni.



June 2023



UOC graduates earn the highest salaries

According to an analysis of the employability of university students by U-Ranking, the BBVA Foundation and the Valencian Institute of Economic Research, UOC graduates earn the most compared to alumni of other Spanish universities. The report states that the average Social Security contribution base for graduates from the UOC is €34,331, the highest in Spain. The report also classifies Spanish universities according to the employability of their graduates, placing the UOC 18th out of the 67 universities analysed.



First Open Chair event

The Museo Nacional Centro de Arte Reina Sofía in Madrid hosted the first Open Chair event organized in association with the UOC. It was conceived to be an annual in-person encounter, with the aim of creating links and dialogue between universities and museums, making it an interstitial space for the training of artists. The initiative aims to contribute to the development of an expanded and connected community of creators and trainee researchers linked to the Study Centre of the museum.

The Mediation Centre of Catalonia – which belongs to the Directorate-General for Law, Legal Entities and Mediation of the Government of Catalonia's Ministry of Justice, Rights and Memory – and the UOC created the Chair in Conflict Resolution, Mediation and Digital Transformation, in order to promote and use mediation as a successful form of conflict resolution in Catalonia.

Fifth EduTECH Emprèn

The UOC's e-learning entrepreneurship initiative, which had already had 76 participants since its inception in 2017, launched its fifth programme to continue developing and promoting technological projects on education. The EduTech Emprèn programme, aimed at projects with an innovative business idea in e-learning, opened a new call for applications. It offered online training sessions on business management, innovation and technology, lasting a total of one hundred hours.



The price of second and successive degrees reduced

The UOC waived the surcharge for studying second and successive degrees, in accordance with the new decree on public university fees, published in the Official Bulletin of the Government of Catalonia (DOGC) on 22 June. The removal of this surcharge reflected the university's priority of responding to the changing needs of individuals, companies and institutions by facilitating lifelong learning.



Supporting the entrepreneurial ecosystem

The College of Economists of Catalonia (CEC), through EconomistesBAN, its network of private investors or business angels, and the UOC signed a collaboration agreement to continue supporting entrepreneurship, creativity and the business culture, contributing to progress by promoting research into the knowledge society, and supporting the development of the economy.

The *Times Higher Education* Young University Ranking, which ranks universities less than fifty years old, placed the UOC among the world's top 150 universities in 2023. It also obtained excellent results and rose four positions in the Spanish classification from the 6th group to the 2nd, together with Ramon Llull University and the University of Vic – Central University of Catalonia, behind only Pompeu Fabra University (18th in the Young University Ranking).



First in-person workshop to promote professional success

The first in-person activity organized by the UOC's Career Services team took place on 11 July, aimed at students and alumni facing their first recruitment processes.

Evolution, alliances and social impact: the three main principles for Àngels Fitó as Rector of the UOC

On 13 April, Àngels Fitó took office as the new rector in a ceremony held in the auditorium of the Can Jaumandreu campus. Fitó commented that the aims of the project she envisions at the head of the institution can be summed up in three principles. The first is to "develop the things we do well and revolutionize the things we can do better." The university's most important values thus include open, shared pathways;

personal, pedagogical and professional support; open transdisciplinary and translational research, and innovation as a driver of change. Her second principle is that "doing things in the company of others is doing them better," acknowledging that "the UOC, like people, is strengthened by alliances." Regarding the third, Fitó stated that "our social impact is non-negotiable."

The event was also attended by the Minister of Research and Universities of the Government of Catalonia, Joaquim Nadal; the Chair of the Board of Trustees of the Fundació per a la Universitat Oberta de Catalunya, Pere Vallès; the outgoing rector, Josep A. Planell; the Directors-General for Universities and Research; the rectors of the other Catalan universities; the members of the FUOC Board of Trustees and Advisory Board; representatives of Barcelona City Council, and teaching and administrative staff from the university.

During her speech, Fitó highlighted the work of her predecessor, Josep A. Planell: "Far from trying to make one size fit all, Rector Planell succeeded in drawing on diverse talents to fulfil a common goal." "With empathy, rigour and sensitivity, and knowing how to listen," she continued, "he was able to give every member of staff the confidence needed to work together harmoniously and in step with each other on our common project."



Fitó pointed out that she has a "powerful triad" that will ensure the UOC has a strong future: "the project, the team and leadership." Regarding the project, which is "inspiring and timely," she described it as "something so simple and at the same time so difficult: going back to our origins to adapt to new realities. Making technology a virtue; making research evidence, and making alliances a system." She also had words

for her team, who are "enthusiastic and committed" and want to set an example by doing things well, stressing that "our commitment is to knowledge." "Knowledge understood in a broad sense, capable of linking the four cardinal points that the European University Association has identified as key elements for Horizon 2030: teaching, research, innovation and culture," she concluded.

For his part, the outgoing rector, Josep A. Planell, reviewed the lessons learnt over a decade at the helm of the University. The first revolves around the role of the UOC, an institution that "has become systemic within the Catalan and Spanish university map," with its pioneering character "playing a key role." He also highlighted the UOC's international vocation, resulting in a

network that allows "a doubly fruitful exchange: showing and offering what we know how to do, learning and assimilating what others have to teach us." Finally, he pointed out, based on his first-hand experiences, that "all our work makes sense at our graduation ceremonies, when you realize the real impact of the UOC," recalling two emotional moments: "when Hisham, a

war refugee and one of our graduates, took the floor to say that 'there is no shame in being poor, but there is no excuse for being ignorant', and when 67-year-old Maria Lluïsa managed to graduate in Business Administration and Management after patriarchal pressure had forced her to postpone her dream."

The event was also attended by the Chair of the FUOC Board of Trustees, Pere Vallès, who highlighted the undeniable milestone of the UOC's 25th anniversary, which does not mean it has become "boring or sleepy," but "a consolidated project that was pioneering yesterday, today systemic and constantly renewed." He also stressed that changing the guard from Rector Planell to Rector Fitó exemplifies "what should be normal: institutional continuity under renewed leadership."

Minister Joaquim Nadal commented that, within the Catalan university system as a whole – which is very strong in terms of academic merit, teaching and research, and solidly mature – the UOC is "a unique institution." "Protected by law and with a specific, unique role," he said, "the UOC is a pivotal university, enabling the bricks-and-mortar universities to work as they should." The minister, who had words of gratitude for Rector Planell for his career and encouragement for Rector Fitó for the future, pointed out that the main challenge is not to lose sight of how, from one year to the next, there is a permanent *aggiornamento* of knowledge that makes it possible for the university to be competitive at the highest level. "The UOC, in its field, must be able to understand how the world and society are evolving and changing; what the challenges are; what inertias must be combated; what the risks are, and what values we must draw on to build the tools that make the research and knowledge system the basis of what a modern country represents."



Who is Àngels Fitó?

Àngels Fitó has a PhD in Economic Sciences from the University of Barcelona. Alongside being a senior professor at the UOC she served as its Vice Rector for Competitiveness and Employability from 2019 until her promotion to rector.

From October 2010 to February 2019, she was dean of the UOC's Faculty of Economics and Business. Throughout her academic career she has specialized in fiscal and financial management and management control, subjects she has taught at various universities (UB, UPC, UAB, UPF and UVic-UCC). She has combined her academic activity with other advisory work in finance and management in both the public and private sectors.

Deputy chair of the College of Economists of Catalonia and member of the Government of Catalonia's Advisory Council on Economic Policy, her fields of research are financial harmonization processes, management control systems and the transformative impact of higher education on employability, taking into account the complexity of labour dynamics. In this field, she leads various local and international initiatives to reconfigure higher education in response to the lifelong learning challenges posed by the current changing times.

Born in Barcelona in 1970, she is the mother of three children and the author of three novels.

Some 500 people attended the inauguration in person, and the YouTube and LinkedIn channels recorded around 4,000 views of the event held in the auditorium at Can Jaumandreu.

The catalogue of official programmes for the 2022/2023 academic year has 27 bachelor's, 54 master's and 9 doctoral

programmes, all accredited by quality agencies and in line with the standards of the European university system. There are also UOC-certified master's degrees, postgraduate programmes and specialization courses, professional training courses, professional development programmes, summer seminars, advanced-level vocational training programmes, and open courses; alongside a Corporate Consulting service, with tailor-made solutions for companies to support them in their employees' professional development.

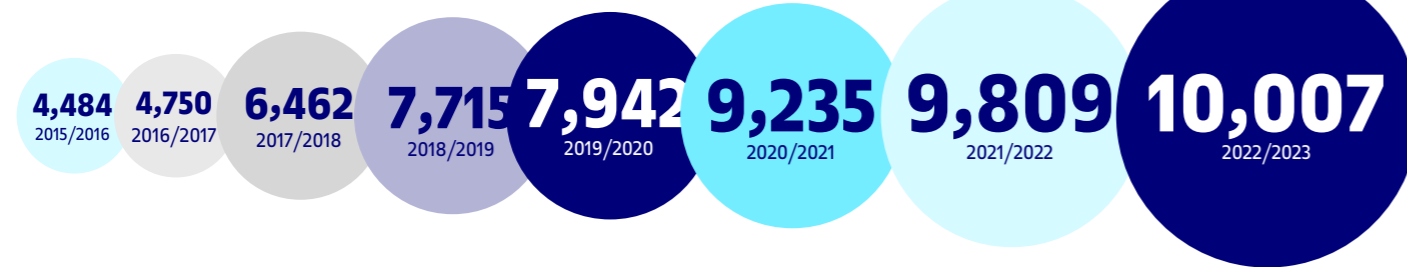

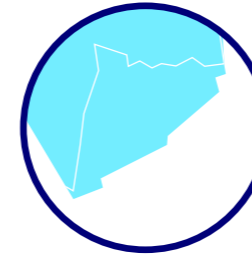

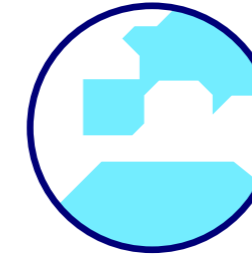

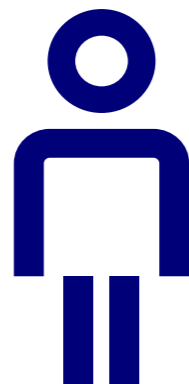

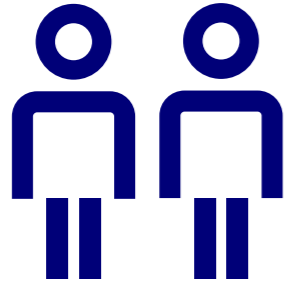

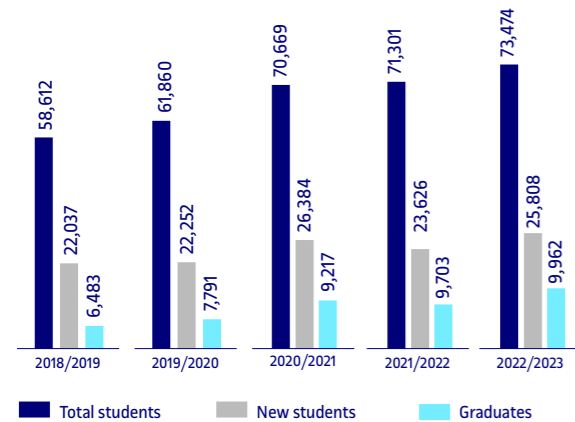

Marta Pons.

Marta is studying for a bachelor's in Psychology. This doctor of Pharmacy says "parental pressure" was behind her choice when she was young. She has now gone back to university led by "pure instinct and my heart." Marta is aware that she will not be able to work professionally because of her age, but she wants to train to do voluntary work in mental health.

Adapting to create equal opportunities

Flexibility, sensitivity, personalization

In recent decades, the number of students entering university with some type of disability has been increasing progressively, favoured by social changes. Despite progress, these students still face numerous challenges in the academic environment.

A study carried out by UOC researchers, published in open access in the *International Journal of Educational Research*, explored the experience of students with disabilities at an online university to discover the potential and the possible deficiencies of this educational model.

The researchers issued a series of recommendations to improve the support that universities offer to students with disabilities.

What else can universities do to support students with disabilities?

The UOC's mission is to make it easier for anyone who wants to undertake lifelong learning to do so. With the primary objective of satisfying each person's learning needs with maximum access to knowledge, the UOC offers an educational model based on tailored

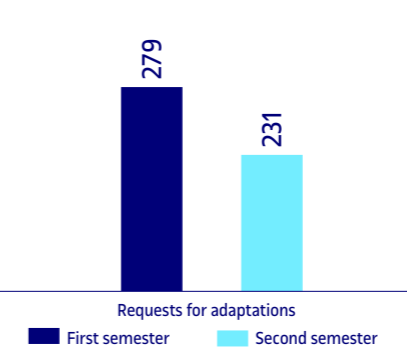
teaching and permanent support for the student, beyond the limitations of time and space. For this reason, since its inception, the UOC has made a significant effort to facilitate access to the university for people with disabilities.

In the 2022/2023 academic year 2,346 people with certified disability levels of 33% or above were studying official programmes and UOC-certified courses at the university. We are one of the leading universities in Spain in terms of the number of disabled students enrolled.

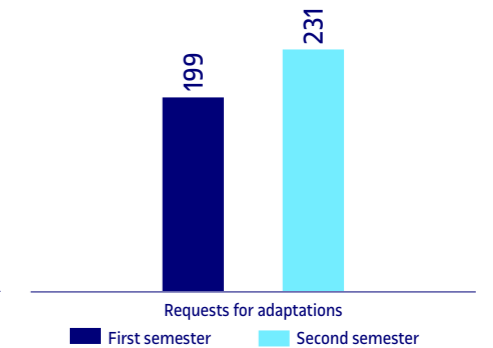
An educational model based on personalization and support

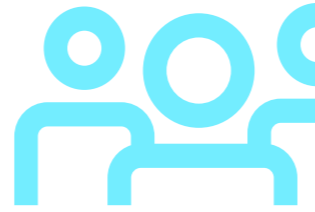
The UOC offers several options for adapting final exams for students who have a specific educational need or recognized disability, are competitive athletes or who report a duly justified exceptional situation.

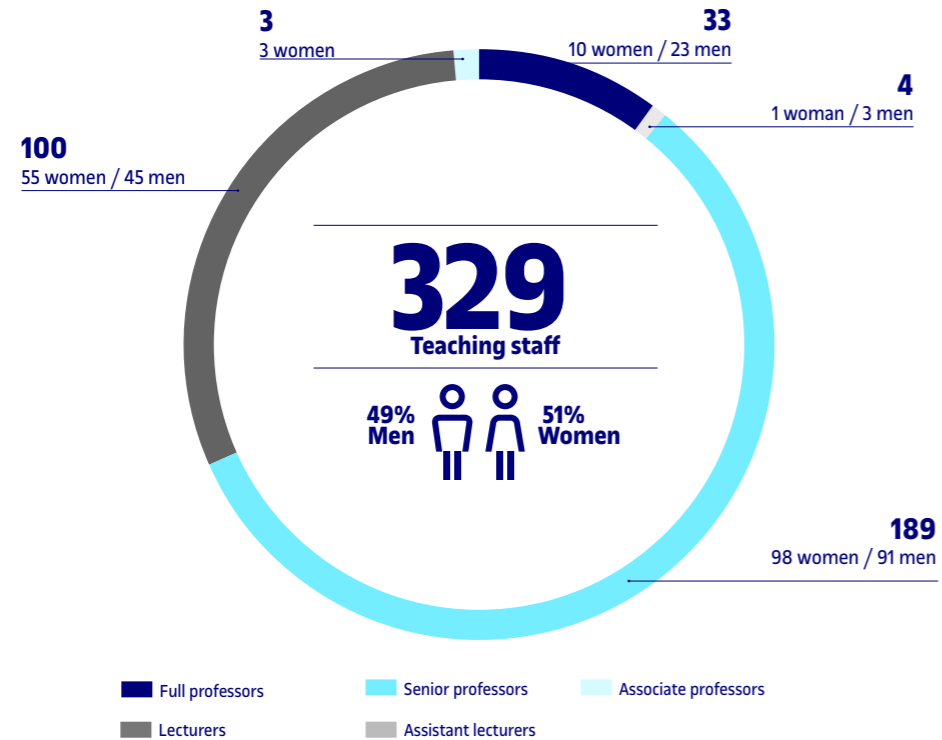
Members of the UOC's teaching staff have different academic roles: faculty, who have an academic profile with full teaching and research capacity; professional experts, who have extensive proven experience

Rolling out the Canvas classroom

The Canvas classroom is the UOC's new learning environment. The new classroom is modern, offers a range of special features and is easy to use. These features translate into a **better learning experience for our students** and a better experience for the team responsible for designing and delivering teaching.

This academic year has seen the culmination of a process of change in the new learning environment that began in the 2021/2022 academic year, when the first students taking professional training courses had the opportunity to learn through the Canvas classroom. In the 2022/2023 academic year, **7,919 students** (5% of the total) were taught through the new learning environment. In the 2023/2024 academic year, 99.8% of our classes will be held in this new classroom.



Supporting students and teachers

Throughout the change process, students, faculty and administrative staff teams have been supported by a comprehensive change management plan in order to ensure a successful transition to this new learning environment.

Within the framework of this strategy, **5,825 people** have received some type of training related to the new classroom, including tutors, coordinating professors, course instructors and administrative staff.

The training plan has been complemented by a communication strategy based on active listening to users' needs and a personalized and multichannel action plan, supported by numerous audiovisual and interactive resources, such as the simulated classroom, contextual and personalized information, and video animations.

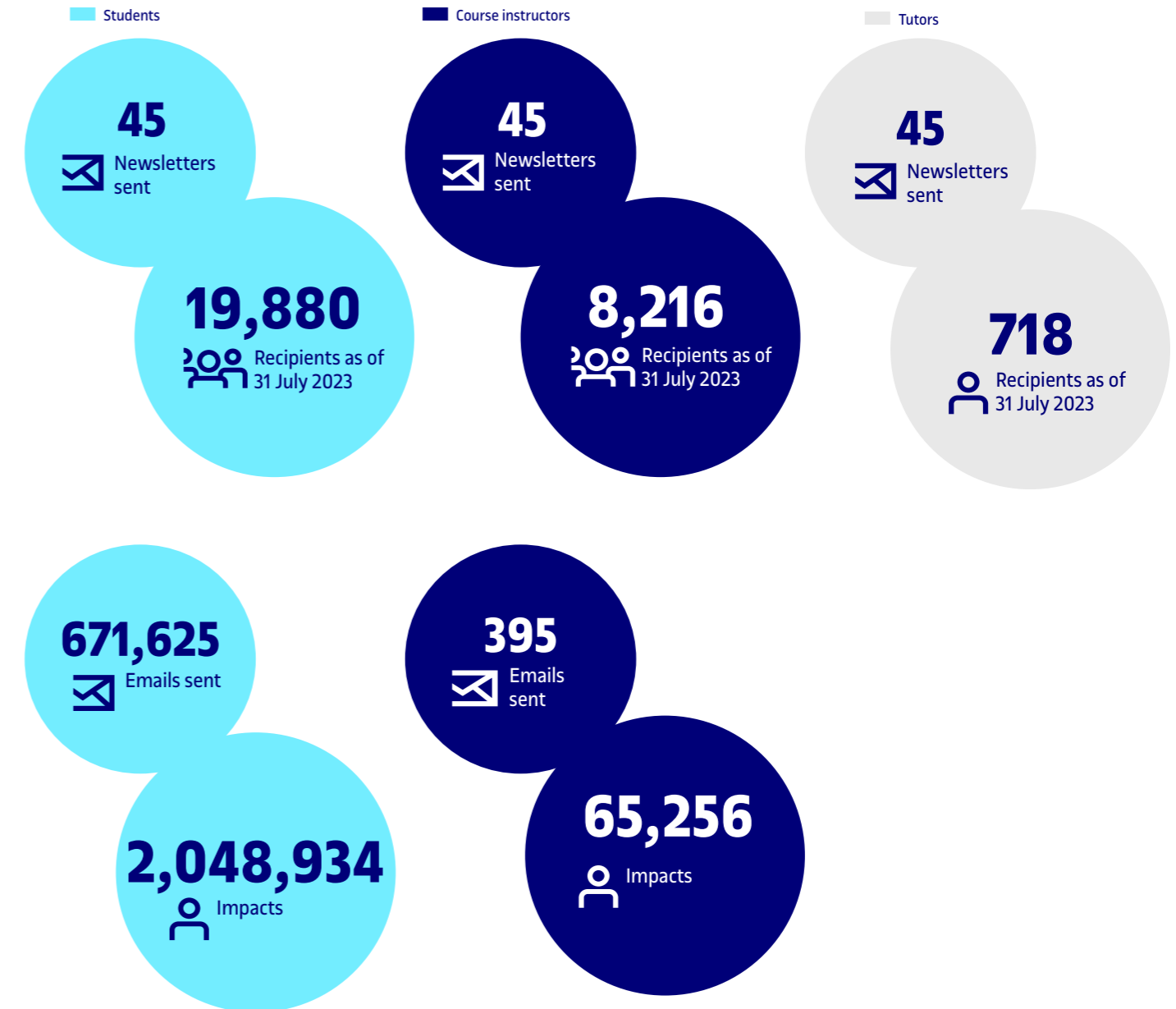

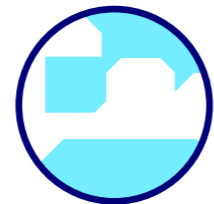

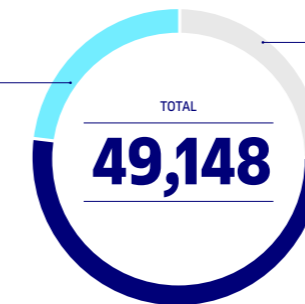

Launch of the UOC's Interdisciplinary R&I Hub

On 28 October, Pere Aragonès, President of the Government of Catalonia, and UOC Rector Josep A. Planell (2013-2023) inaugurated the UOC's Interdisciplinary R&I Hub, a cornerstone of the university's ecosystem, driving interdisciplinary, cutting-edge research of the highest standard to provide solutions in three major areas in which we have recognized expertise: e-learning, e-health and the network society.

The new remodelled building, located in the Can Jaumandreu complex, in Barcelona's 22@ district, aims to foster the growth of research at the university. The Hub is a fundamental part of the research and innovation ecosystem, bringing together in one place research and support staff, labs, international collaborators, doctoral students and all the other actors and assets of research at the UOC in order to facilitate and maximize interactions between them and between the different disciplines.

It was created with the aim of linking all these assets and providing an optimal environment to carry out more research, with a more interdisciplinary approach and a greater social impact.

What research distinguishes the UOC?

UOC research specializes in the study of the interaction between human activity and technology, especially the network society, e-learning and e-health.

Science is approached from a digital perspective, ensuring that the knowledge generated through research is open to everyone. It is research with a transdisciplinary approach and a desire to generate new knowledge thanks to the merging of combined disciplines (interdisciplinarity).



UOC research, a two-minute overview

UOC Labs: eight specialized laboratories

The Hub is home to UOC Labs, eight research laboratories designed as a cooperative project. The eight laboratories in the Hub are divided into six laboratories linked to specific areas of research, and two generalist laboratories working on interdisciplinary projects:

Specialized laboratories

NeuroLab: the study of the brain

NeuroLab is a research facility specializing in neuropsychology and neuroscience, which follows in the footsteps of the Cognitive NeuroLab. It focuses on the study of human cognitive processes, their alterations and their recovery or rehabilitation.

Audiovisual & Sound Lab: creativity and cultural experimentation

The Audiovisual & Sound Lab is a multidisciplinary visual and sound space where the research team can produce and experiment with video and audio content adapted to the changing online world, exploring new audiovisual formats and addressing new contemporary audiences.

Design & Maker Lab: digital design and manufacturing

The Design & Maker Lab is a space for experimentation in digital design and manufacturing that provides instruments, software, hardware and technical advice for research into the future of design and new digital manufacturing and operations processes.

XR Lab: immersive technologies

The newly created laboratories include the XR Lab, dedicated to immersive technologies (virtual reality, augmented reality and mixed reality). The main lines of research focus on immersive technologies, and their applications in health and the world of education.

Social Networks & Gaming Lab: digital communication networks

The Social Networks & Gaming Lab is dedicated to practical research into social networks and digital socialization environments. It is a space for interaction between researchers, equipped for work with computers and microelectronic devices.

Wireless Networks Lab: cyber-physical systems

The Wireless Networks Lab is designed to support cyber-physical systems research and development, facilitating cutting-edge research while allowing systems of this type to be prototyped, measured and evaluated.

Generalist laboratories

TechLab: computer technology

TechLab is a consolidated generalist laboratory, a space for experimentation, both physical and virtual, that offers services for teaching, research and innovation in the university's faculties and institutes. It provides instruments, software, hardware and technical advice to develop students' practical skills, and gives technological support for research and innovation for the university of the future.

Data Science Lab: analysis of large volumes of data

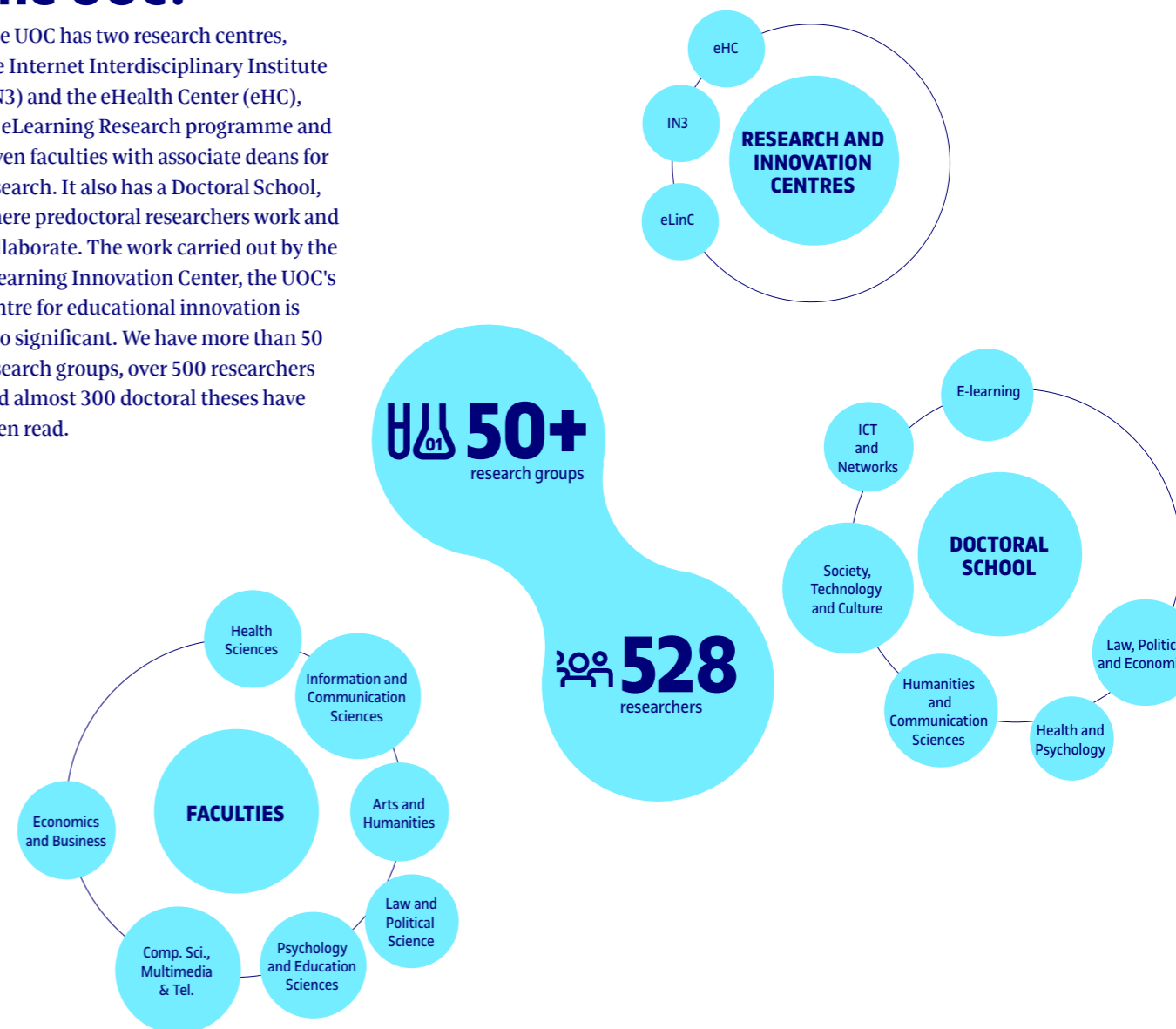
The Data Science Lab is a consolidated UOC laboratory designed to help researchers deal with quantitative data throughout the research process. In other words, it is a space for managing and extracting knowledge from large volumes of data (big data).

The UOC's new research hub hosts eight specialized laboratories in a collaborative and interdisciplinary environment



Who does research at the UOC?

The UOC has two research centres, the Internet Interdisciplinary Institute (IN3) and the eHealth Center (eHC), an eLearning Research programme and seven faculties with associate deans for research. It also has a Doctoral School, where predoctoral researchers work and collaborate. The work carried out by the eLearning Innovation Center, the UOC's centre for educational innovation is also significant. We have more than 50 research groups, over 500 researchers and almost 300 doctoral theses have been read.



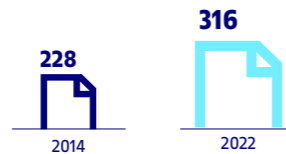
In 2022 research continued to grow

The UOC's research capacity has greatly increased in recent years, in terms of the number of researchers, research groups, projects and its ability to attract external funding, and also in international collaborations and knowledge transfer. In 2022 the UOC had 51 research groups and 577 people engaged in research and innovation, an increase of 41.77% compared to 2014. The competitive funds it was awarded tripled in the seven years between 2014 and 2021, to €6.6m. The number of scientific articles it published also tripled in the same period (642 in 2021), and 44.08% of those were as part of international collaborations. In the transfer field, in 2021 the UOC had 21 patents and had founded 4 spin-off companies (17 and 3 more than in 2014, respectively). Today, the UOC has a hundred ongoing research projects that are being carried out with Spanish and international competitive funds.

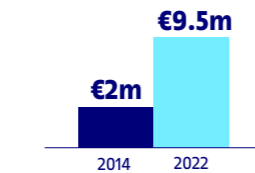
In addition, it has promoted open access to the knowledge generated at the university, disseminating its research within the framework of an initiative that the UOC has supported year after year.

Research funding

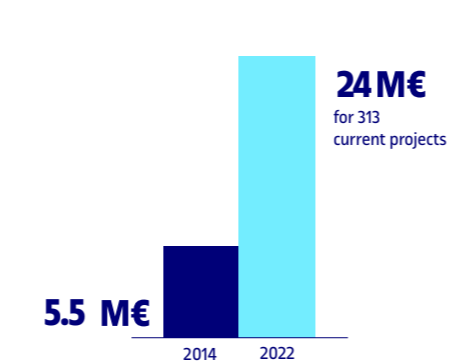
Research project proposals submitted

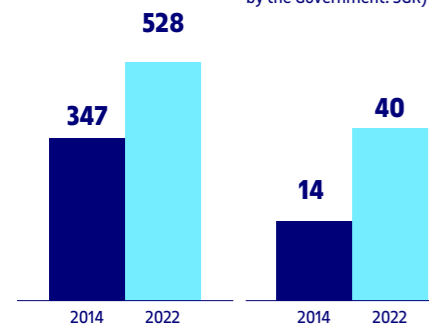

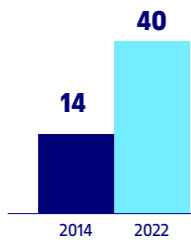

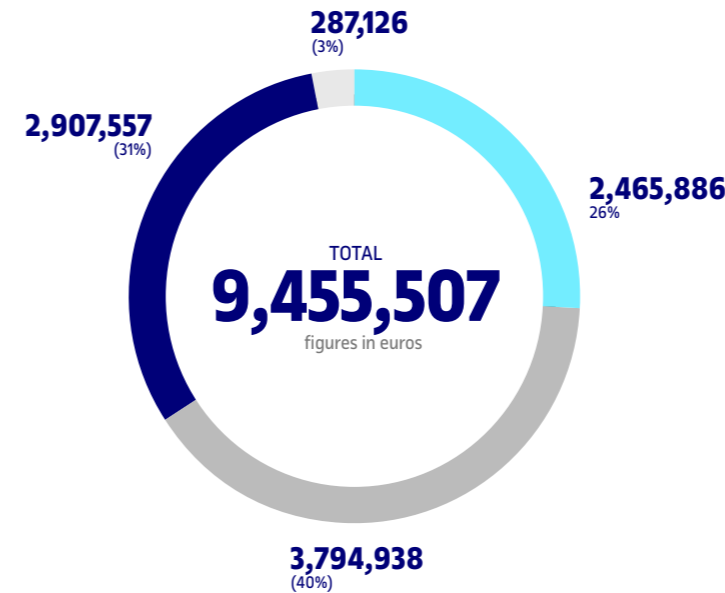


More support for quality research

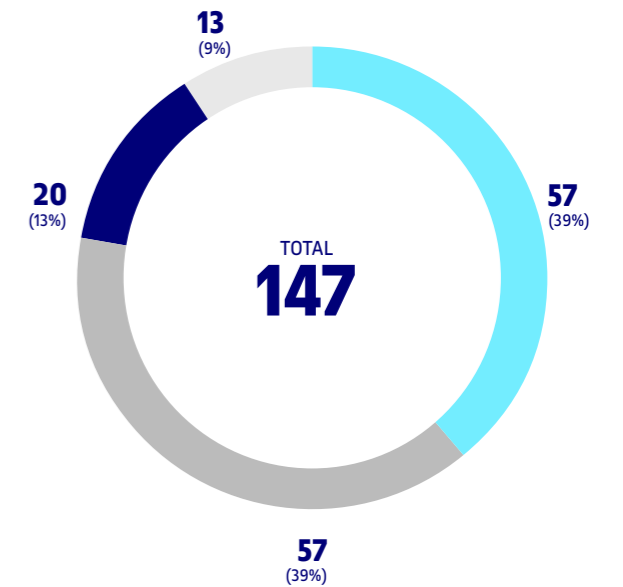


External project funding awarded to the UOC in 2022, by geographical area

Number of projects awarded to the UOC in 2022 by geographical area



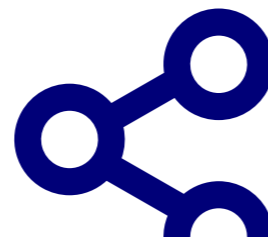

eHealth Project: From Idea to Project awards

The Centre has held the third call for the **eHealth Project: From Idea to Project** grants, making €3,000 available to develop eHealth projects, aimed at students and alumni of the UOC's Faculty of Health Sciences and Faculty of Computer Science, Multimedia and Telecommunications. Grants of €3,000 have been awarded to two projects: **Smart monitoring stroke** (Jorge Pagola, a University Master's Degree in E-Health student) and **ProteoMarker** (Patricia Martínez Botía, who is studying for the University Master's Degree in Bioinformatics and Biostatistics).

Call for applications for Proof of Concept

With the aim of encouraging transdisciplinary and interdisciplinary research, the eHealth Center has announced the results of its second **Proof of Concept** call, aimed at the entire eHealth research community at the university.

Knowledge transfer

Bellvitge University Hospital has implemented the application **El Meu Quiròfan**, which won the 2020 eHealth Project: From Idea to Project grant, awarded by the eHealth Center.

The application is based on an innovative idea of Dr Esther Méndez, who is attached to the hospital's Anaesthesiology and Reanimation department and a student of the University Master's Degree in E-Health at the Universitat Oberta de Catalunya.

The Director of the eHealth Center, Marta Aymerich, a member of the Faculty of Health Sciences' eHealthLab research group, led a project to design **TEAappAutism**, an app to help counteract the lack of tools for relationships and communication with people with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). The app was co-created with users and professionals and developed by several members of the eHealth Lab and staff at the Parc Taulí Hospital.

International alliances and networks

During this period, the UOC's AIWELL research group joined the Catalan unit of the [European Laboratory for Learning and Intelligent Systems](#). It is the pan-European network of excellence in artificial intelligence (AI), which connects the best researchers in this field.

The Center continues to develop a map of strategic alliances. The AIWELL, BDLab and eHealth Lab research groups have joined the TECSAM network. The Cognition and Language Research Group (GRECIL) is one of the founders of the Spanish-speaking Association for the Study of Specific Language Impairment (ATELHI). In addition, during this period

the eHealth Center and TISAC have signed an agreement to promote digital health in Latin America.

Moreover, through the efforts of the eHealth Lab research group, the eHealth Center is fully committed to working with the World Health Organization in the fight against [neglected tropical diseases](#) (NTDs). A result of this collaboration is Assessing the Quality of the World Health Organization's Skin NTDs App as a Training Tool in Ghana and Kenya. During this period, the [Barcelona Aging CoLLaboratory](#) (BALL) was launched. It is the first living lab focusing on providing

innovative solutions for the elderly in Catalonia. This initiative is supported by a broad cross-section of civil society. The lab is located in the Parc Sanitari Pere Virgili hospital and, within the UOC, BALL is affiliated to the eHealth Center, which participates in its strategic committee with the other founding partners, is an active driving force behind the initiative and will promote various laboratory projects focusing on e-health.

IAU SDG 3 Cluster

It has been a busy year for the SDG 3 Cluster of the International Association of Universities (IAU), led by the UOC through the eHealth Center. In March 2023, after three years of remote meetings, activities and projects, the Cluster was able to hold its **first face-to-face meeting**. The meeting once again demonstrated the wealth of things institutions can learn from each other and that collaboration is key to addressing systemic global health problems.

The IAU's SDG 3 Cluster has also been developing a website where it publishes all the work it does. The [website](#) is now public and available to everyone.

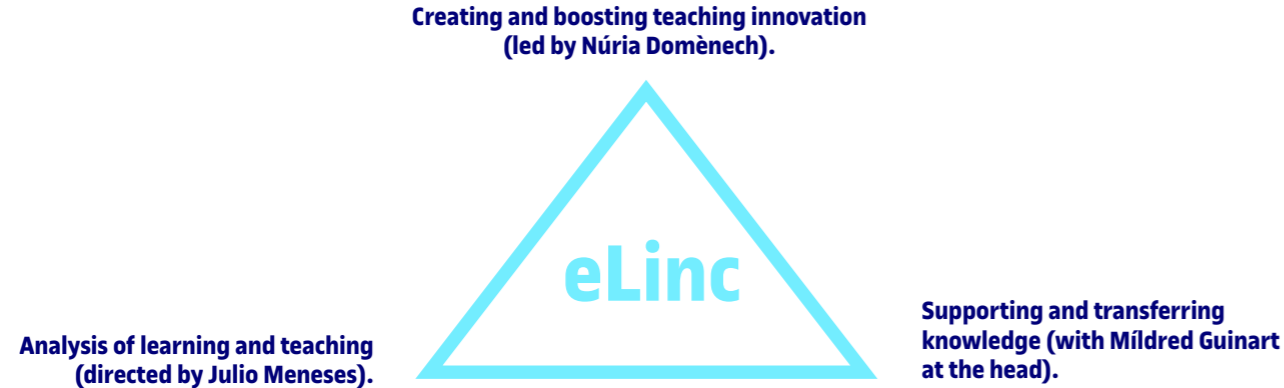

We are simplifying the organizational structure of the eLinC along methodological lines

Parallel to the development of the usual services and the projects carried out throughout the academic year, including managing the change to the new LMS, the eLinC has been reorganized to be more efficient and better able to engage throughout the university.

Coinciding with the change in the university's leadership, the eLinC has begun to develop a working mechanism in three sub-areas, which were previously four operational groups:



This structural organization is also methodological and is intended to successfully support major strategic initiatives, such as the one we are provisionally calling #Projecte9, created at the instigation of Rector Fitó to connect existing projects for supporting and recognizing competencies: Graf, Folio, GPS and Microcredex.

Introduction of the new classroom activity monitoring report

Along with the change to the new LMS, the eLinC has gone one step further in the use of learning analytics at the UOC. Working with the Data Office, the Technology department, the Deputy General Manager for Teaching and the Office of the Vice Rector for Teaching and Learning, the eLinC has set up a new space in Power BI to monitor teachers and students in the new classrooms, developing a set of new indicators to give coordinating professors a real-time overview of the teaching taking place. Part of the UOC's ecosystem of teaching tools, the classroom activity monitoring report should improve our knowledge of teaching and learning processes, facilitating decision-making aimed at improving teaching quality and, ultimately, UOC students' experience.

Internal and external knowledge transfer

In the last year, we have been involved in internal knowledge transfer, promoting various teaching methodologies, such as project-based work, which has led to improvements in the learning process of master's and postgraduate students, and gamification, supporting a project across the faculties to implement innovation and continuous improvement in courses and programmes.

The introduction of the new LMS called for an in-depth methodological understanding of the new platform and its possibilities, requiring us to provide good methodological guidance for the new situation.

To contribute to external knowledge transfer, four new episodes of the eLinC podcast *Días singulares en universidades singulares* [Singular Days at Singular Universities] have been produced, taking guests on a walk through significant environments. The cross-cutting theme in each chapter has been, as always, tackling

the great challenges of higher education from different points of view.

Through the Dialogues initiative, organized together with the Monterrey Institute of Technology and Higher Education (Tecnológico de Monterrey) and the Pontifical Catholic University of Peru (PUCP), discussions have been held on subjects such as the future of online assessment, personalization and the impact of generative AI on higher education.

The support service for the improvement of online educational models offered by the eLinC has visited the Peruvian Cayetano Heredia University (UPCH), the Technological University of Uruguay (UTEC) and Chile's Andrés Bello National University (UNAB). We have lent our support to the three institutions as they consider the impact of incorporating online and hybrid modes in their educational models.

The Canvas classroom: today and tomorrow

Within the LMS change management project, a plan has been drawn up to train and support teachers who have started work in the new environment, as well as the management team that participates in academic operations. The DIANA (Classroom Design and Analysis) group has continued to work in parallel with a multidisciplinary team of academics and managers, co-creating and validating solutions for the new classroom that respond to the teaching needs of the UOC model, always taking the experience of students and faculty into account to ensure a successful transition.

Apart from the deployment of the new LMS, the eLinC has begun developing a strategic plan to improve teaching spaces within this new paradigm, in line with the UOC model, the features of

the new LMS and the international EdTech context. Work has also been done on the development of operations that respond effectively and efficiently to the challenges of a new classroom within an organization as complex as the UOC. The objective is for teams to advance and work together with a vision of what will come, focusing on continuous improvement and the evolution of teaching and learning.

Doctoral School

Balance between online and face-to-face activities

This academic year, the number of online thesis defences has equalled face-to-face and hybrid defences at the Doctoral School.

The welcome session for doctoral students for the 2022/2023 academic year could once again be held in person, although students were offered the option of attending online.

An induction session was organized for new predoctoral research staff contracted with grants, including a visit to the Interdisciplinary R&I Hub at the Poblenou Campus.

By the end of the 2022/2023 academic year, 284 theses had been read at the Doctoral School, 31 of them in this academic year (15 in person and 16 online). One degree was recognized, and there were 398 active doctoral students, belonging to 52 different nationalities. Of these active doctoral students, 76 were

under contract with the UOC with a grant or financial assistance to complete their doctoral thesis and six were employed via industrial doctoral programmes. This year a fellowship has also been awarded to **Dr José Israel Reyes Reyes** for the fourth year running, to continue with his postdoctoral research. The prize for the best interdisciplinary thesis of the 2021/2022 academic year was awarded *ex aequo* to **Dr Fernando Álvarez López**, for his thesis Use of simulation with gesture-mediated 3D virtual reality for the learning of basic psychomotor skills in minimally invasive surgery, and **Dr Xanthippi Tsortanidou**, for her thesis Developing Social-Emotional, New Media Literacy and Computational Thinking Skills through Unplugged Approach and Imagination-based Pedagogies in Primary Education Students.

Start of a new doctoral programme and activities of special interest

During the academic year, teaching began on a new online doctoral programme, in Law, Politics and Economics, and the Doctoral School has once again assisted with the contest "Present your thesis in 4 minutes", organized by the Catalan Foundation for Research and Innovation (FCRI), with the support of the Government of Catalonia, in which all Catalan universities participate with the aim of promoting dissemination activities among doctoral students. In this sixth year of the contest, the UOC representative who participated in the final, chosen through a first qualifying stage held face-to-face, was

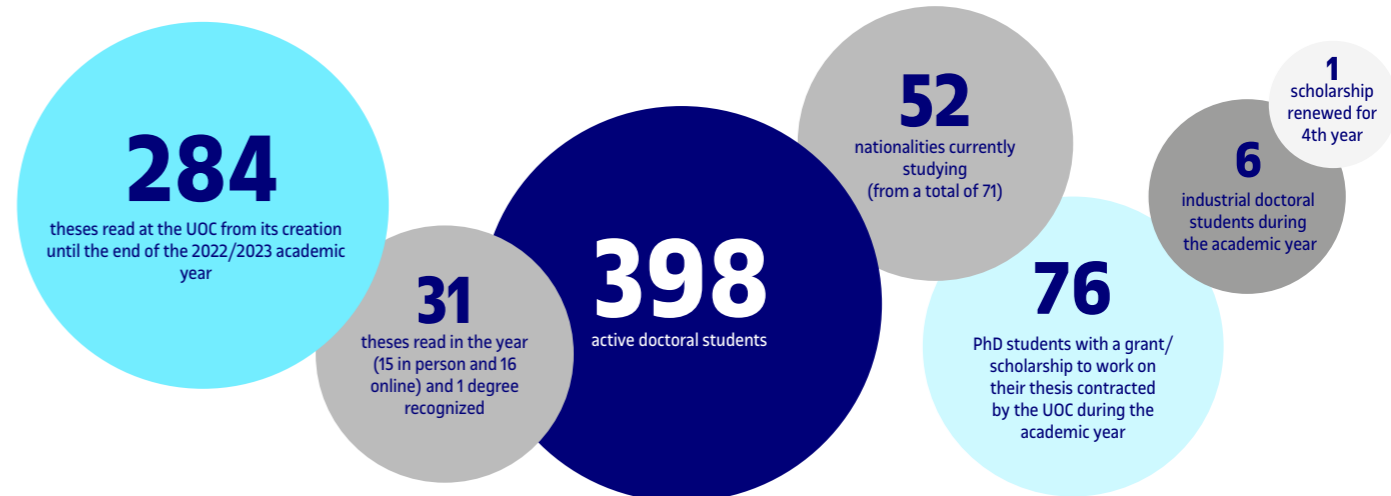
doctoral student **Alejandro García Alamán**, from the Health and Psychology programme, with his thesis project Differences in self-presentation and partner selection strategies in online dating apps. The student chosen for the audience award was **Luis Esteban Peñaherrera Sandoval**, from the Education and ICT (e-Learning) programme, with his thesis project Design and implementation of a programme to prevent problems with reading by stimulating morphosyntax in pre-school children.

This year we again participated in the contest "#HiloTesis: Tu Tesis Doctoral en un Hilo de Twitter", organized by the Conference of Rectors of Spanish Universities (CRUE) with the support of RedDivulga and the Ignacio Larramendi Foundation, with the aim of promoting the development of communication and scientific dissemination skills among doctoral students and recently qualified doctors. A total of almost 400 theses were disseminated via Twitter and 47 finalists were selected all over Spain. The UOC was represented by recently qualified PhD **Pablo Rey Mazón** whose [Twitter thread](#) was among the finalists.

Another milestone was the UOC's "First LGBTIQA+ Pride Research Conference: A Future with a Long History", held in hybrid format, organized by a group of first-year doctoral researchers and UOC professors, with the support of the Doctoral School and the assistance of the Equality unit. Its aim was to create a space for dialogue and reflection on LGBTIQA+ issues in order to make them visible, taking an active role in favour of equality and respect for sex-gender-sexual dissidence. The conference was a success, attended by about 50 people in person and 27 online.

Research by our faculties

Faculty of Arts and Humanities

The research mission of the Faculty of Arts and Humanities is to develop theoretical tools and methodologies to better understand the complexity of the world's languages, cultures and societies, based on a humanistic approach and a knowledge of social sciences, applying an ethical and inclusive perspective that supports sustainability.

During 2022, the team produced 94 publications (10 books, 35 book chapters and 52 indexed articles). The 16 projects awarded include:

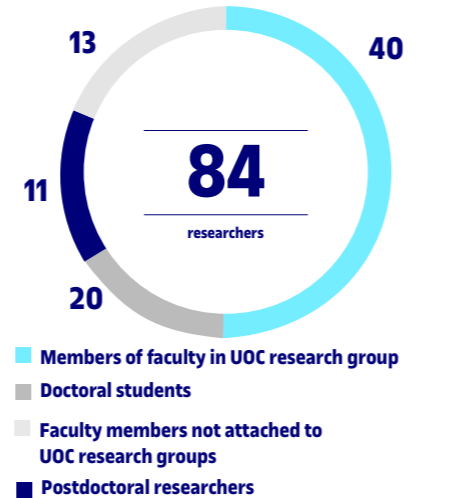

Awards and accolades

2022 has been a good year in terms of awards and distinctions for the work of the faculty's researchers: **Joana Maria Pujadas** was the recipient of the Louis Henry Award, presented by the European Society of Historical Demography in recognition of her research; **Alba Colombo** was honoured, as co-author, with the **2022 Literati Award** from the *International Journal of Event and Festival Management*, which recognizes the best article published in one of the leading journals dealing with Event Studies and Critical Event Studies and **Jaume Claret** was appointed member of the Group of Experts on "Recovery of the historical and democratic memory of Spanish science". The group's aim is to help restore historical memory of science in Spain, in the context of Spain's new Democratic Memory Law.



Faculty of Psychology and Education Sciences

The research carried out by the Faculty of Psychology and Education Sciences is organized around three pillars: education and ICT; psychology, health and quality of life; and social action, community and innovation. Within these fields of knowledge, the Faculty defines areas of study relating to specific groups and challenges (childhood, youth, the elderly, gender, disability, health and education users and professionals), with a contextualized approach respecting where the research is carried out (communities, work and organizations, participation

and networks, management and policies, schools, families and city, health centres). The areas where these groups and contexts intersect can be analysed from many different perspectives.

Six groups are working within the Faculty: **Feed2Learn**, **Edu@b**, **LES**, **Smart Classroom Project**, **Child Tech Lab** and **IPCS** (joint: UB-UOC). Three are members of the IN3 (**CareNet**, **GenTIC** and **Turba Lab**) and two are affiliated to the eHealth Center (**GRECIL** and **BDLab**). Some research staff also carry out research

in groups linked to other faculties, such as the **eHealth Lab**, the **Cognitive Neurolab** and **Epi4Health** in the Faculty of Health Sciences, and the **Nodes** group in the Faculty of Information and Communication Sciences. Synergies have also been established with groups in other centres and universities: **SINTE (UAB-URL-UOC)**, **JovenTIC (URV, UAB, UOC)**, **QPsych (UB, UOC)**, **NUTRISAM (URV, UOC)**, **LMI (UB, UVic-UCC, ICO)**, etc.

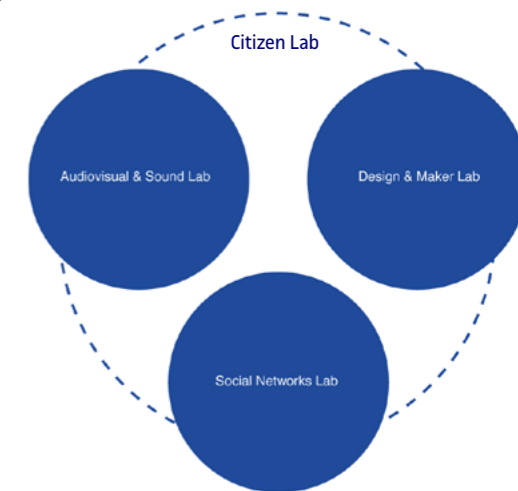

During 2022, our team led or participated in 22 competitive research projects or research contracts, producing a total of 34 articles, chapters or books on network society, education and ICT, and creativity and digital culture.

We were also present in the Interdisciplinary R&I Hub, where we revitalized the Audiovisual & Sound Lab, the Social Networks Lab and the Design & Maker Lab. These labs are an open area for research, knowledge transfer and

1. Research in communication, design and digital culture.
2. The production of formats for the transfer and dissemination of knowledge.
3. A citizen laboratory where university and society cooperate on developments in the field of digital creativity, audiovisuals and communication.



Faculty of Law and Political Science

The Faculty of Law and Political Science carries out intense research activity in its mission to become an international authority on the impact of digital technology and the internet on law, politics and criminology from different areas of expertise. Faculty members published dozens of scientific papers in indexed journals, books and book chapters in 2022.

Research is organized around several recognized groups:

- **Consolidated SGR groups:** research group in Empirical and Applied Victimology; Law, Internet and Digital Transformation (DIDT) group; Taxation, Labour Relations and Business (TAXBUSINESS) group; eGovernance: Electronic Administration and Democracy (GADE) group.

- **Emerging SGR group:** Geopolitics, Conflict and Human Rights (GEOCONDAH) study group.
- Other UOC groups with the participation of Faculty of Law and Political Science staff: Transdisciplinary Research Group on Contemporary Social Challenges (NODES); Urban Transformation and Global Change Laboratory (TURBA Lab) (IN3).

Throughout 2022 the teaching staff has been working on nine research projects funded within the framework of the faculty's groups, both national and international, as well as other projects in various universities.

Faculty of Economics and Business

Research in the Faculty of Economics and Business is organized into six consolidated SGR research groups (**DIGIBIZ**, **NOUTUR**, **I2TIC**, **MeL**, **KIMO** and **TURBA**, **IN3**), an emerging SGR group (**SUMAT**) and an in-house group (**FM2**), as well as several teams of researchers working on nationally and internationally funded research projects, both academic and applied. It is based on a quality research model, strongly oriented towards collaboration, collegiality and academic and social impact, with a clear internationalizing dimension.

At the thematic level, the research focuses on the digital transformation of the economy and business, with special emphasis on social impact, sustainability and responsibility. It has a clear emphasis on analysing the socioeconomic and regional factors contributing to technological change and their impact on management and policies, as borne out by the cross-cutting project on the sharing or platform economy.

Faculty of Computer Science, Multimedia and Telecommunications

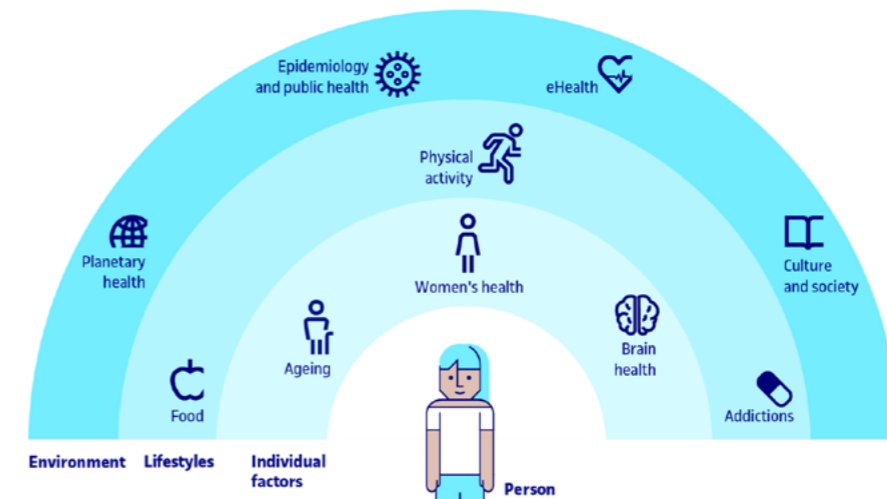
Research in the Faculty of Computer Science, Multimedia and Telecommunications is organized into research groups distributed between the two UOC research centres (IN3 and eHC) and the faculties, creating synergies between research and teaching. Currently the research groups of the Faculty of Computer Science, Multimedia and Telecommunications are ICSO, SmartLearn, SOM, TEKING and LAIKA. The eHC groups with the participation of Faculty of Computer Science,

Multimedia and Telecommunications teaching staff are AIWELL and ADaS, while the IN3 groups with faculty participation are CoSIN3, KISON and WINE.

The groups' research areas include the application of artificial intelligence in various fields (health, computer vision, software engineering, etc.), complex systems, optimization, distributed systems, computer security, e-learning, software engineering, wireless communications and data science.

Faculty of Health Sciences

At the UOC's Faculty of Health Sciences, we are aware of the importance of conducting research that has a real impact on society. That is why we work to **understand** various areas related to the environment, lifestyles and individuals to develop preventive **measures and actions**. All our research is conducted from the perspective of the social determinants of health, with an inclusive and equitable vision. We focus on seven areas of knowledge: **women's health, ageing, neuropsychology, food, nutrition and physical activity, digital health, planetary health, and epidemiology and public health**. The teaching and research staff belong to four consolidated research groups (epi4Health, FoodLab, eHealth Lab and Cognitive NeuroLab), the WHO Collaborating Centre for Digital Health, the UNESCO Chair on Food, Culture and Development, and the numerous alliances and agreements we establish with other research groups, health centres and groups of people affected by a specific disease, both locally and internationally. In 2022 this allowed us to participate in several competitive projects, of which three have European funding: DigiCanTrain and Transition, which seek to improve the digital skills of oncology professionals, and PlanEAT, which aims to understand and improve eating habits to make them healthier and more sustainable.

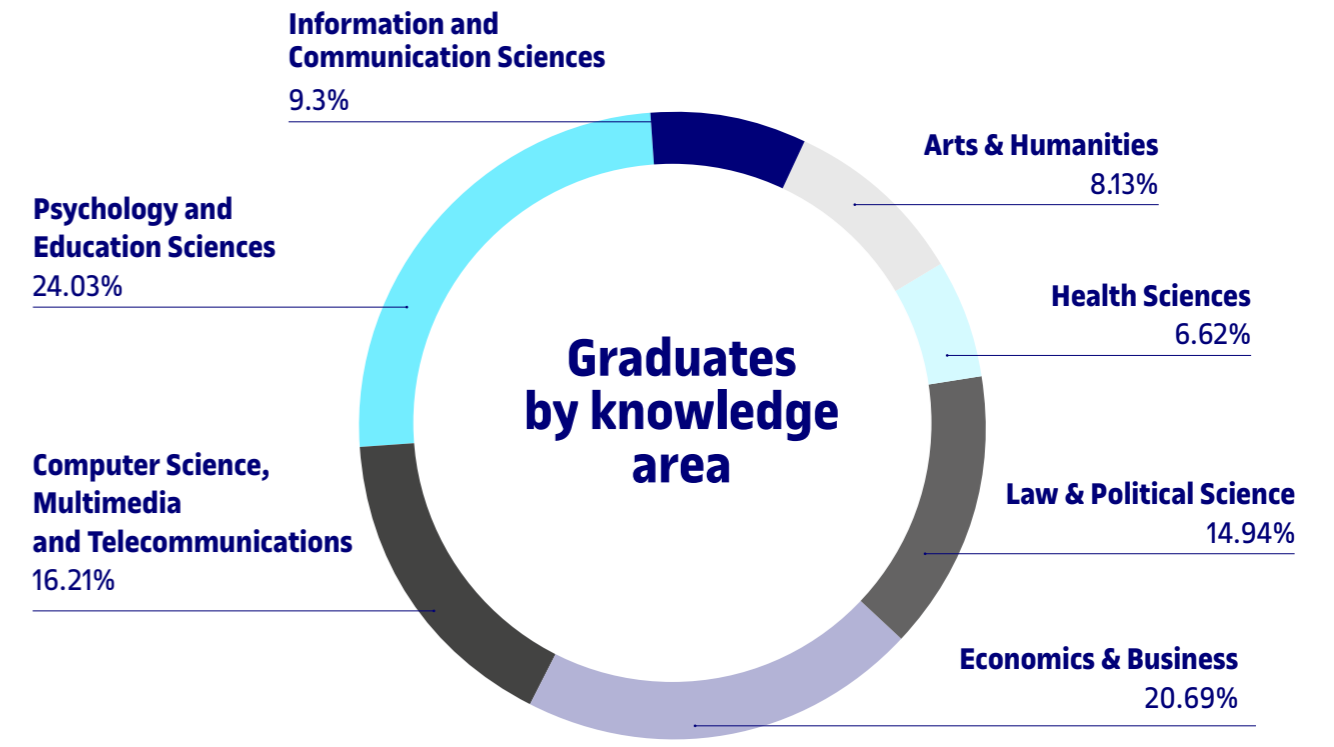
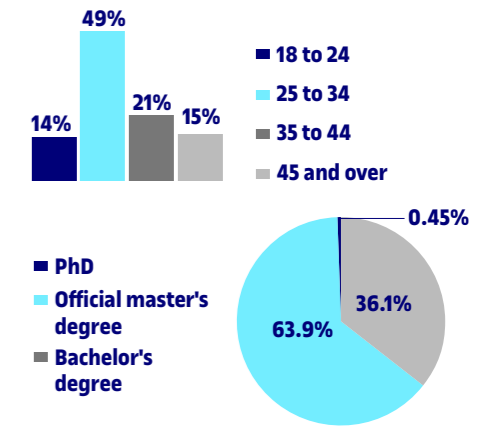

UOC graduates earn the highest salaries

According to an analysis of the employment of university graduates carried out by U-Ranking, the BBVA Foundation and the Valencian Institute of Economic Research (IVIE), graduates of the Universitat Oberta de Catalunya (UOC) earn more than alumni from other Spanish universities. According to the report, the average Social Security contribution base for UOC graduates is €34,331, the highest in Spain.

The report also ranks Spain's universities according to the employability of their graduates, and places the UOC in 18th position of the 67 universities listed. In addition to the general ranking, it places the UOC in the following positions for specific areas of knowledge:

First in graduate employment for social sciences, journalism, and documentation (out of 53)

Second in arts and humanities (out of 50)

Ninth in business, administration and law (out of 70)

Eleventh in education (out of 57)

Twelfth in engineering, industry and construction (out of 62)

Fifteenth in computer science (out of 45)



Graduation ceremonies, a moment of celebration and recognition

The class of 2021/2022 celebrated its graduation in spring, at well-attended events in hybrid format: online or in person in Barcelona or Madrid. At the graduation ceremonies we celebrated this important milestone with more than 10,000 new graduates. 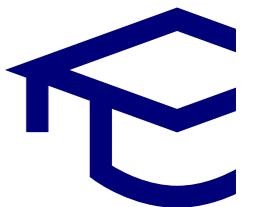

Five years ago, thanks to these studies, "I was able to start working in some legal practices and offices and, for the last two years, I've been legal advisor in my company's legal department," he said.

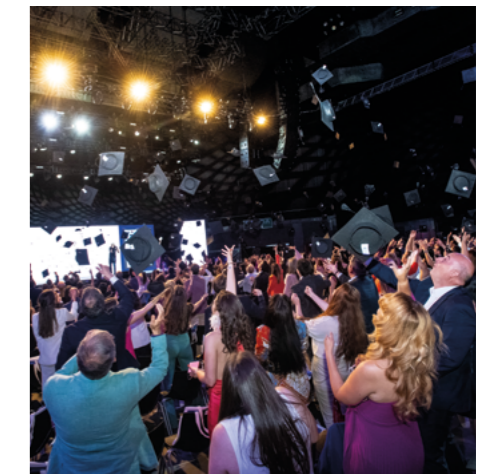

Supporting entrepreneurs

Hubbik promotes innovative ideas and projects related to the UOC's fields of knowledge and provides business advice adapted to the needs of each project: from validating the business idea to accelerating its development. It offers a variety of entrepreneurial support programmes for the entire UOC community (students, alumni, faculty, course instructors, and research and administrative staff), fostering collaboration between them and placing university-generated knowledge at their disposal.

UOC and UB research into learning environments and smart classrooms becomes a spin-off

According to scientific evidence, the role of the classroom space in learning and in the physical and psychological well-being of students and teachers is key, especially with the arrival of the digital age. This is demonstrated by the Smart Classroom Project research group, created by the UOC and the UB five years ago in response to the need to rethink learning spaces to implement active learning methodologies and improve users' experiences. The company designs classroom spaces to meet new pedagogical needs, treating the space as a vital part of change so important it is often referred to as the *third teacher*.

Agrodit, a smart irrigation technology promoted by Business Administration and Management student Maria Martínez, won the jury prize for best project at SpinUOC 2023, an initiative that stimulates innovation, knowledge transfer and entrepreneurship.

Paula Ferrer Raventós won the audience prize with her InSkin project. This is a tool that aims to improve the quality of dermocosmetic product recommendations by medical and pharmaceutical professionals and reduce the time and effort they dedicate to them. A PhD student working in a start-up that hopes to revolutionize the diagnosis

and treatment of Alzheimer's, she has completed her bachelor's degree in Psychology at the UOC.

The BegIA platform has received the Ramón Molinas Foundation Award for the best project with social impact. It is a mobile application that allows the early detection of eye diseases that cause blindness. It is the work of Igor García, graduate in Physics and Electronic Engineering and a student of the University Master's Degree in Bioinformatics and Biostatistics (joint: UOC, UB), and Francisca Villanueva, who is studying the same master's degree.

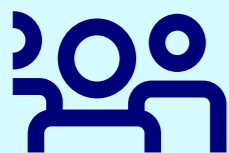

Governing and participatory bodies

The UOC's organizational structure seeks to meet the goals and targets set by the Foundation's Board of Trustees and the university's Governing Council.

The University Council, in the process of selecting the fourth rector of the UOC, issued a favourable report on the proposal by the Board of Trustees to appoint Dr Àngels Fitó.



The university's governing bodies

Fundació per a la Universitat Oberta de Catalunya The Foundation, which was established on 6 October 1994, is the owner of the Universitat Oberta de Catalunya. The Board of Trustees is the Foundation's highest representative, governing and administrative body under Article 9 of its Statutes. The Standing Committee is the permanent administrative and management body of the FUOC by delegation of the Board of Trustees.

Governing Council

The Governing Council is the university's governing body as provided in Article 13 of the university's Organizational and Operational Regulations currently in force. It is composed of the rector, the vice rectors, the general manager, the general secretary, and one representative each for the teaching staff, students and administrative staff.

Executive Board

This is a permanent management and administrative body composed of the rector, the vice rectors, the general manager and the general secretary.

The university community's participation and representation bodies

University Council

The University Council is the UOC community's highest participatory body. It is composed of the members stipulated in the UOC's Organizational and Operational Regulations, and it is chaired by the rector of the university. Representatives of teachers, administrative staff and students are elected to it. The academic staff constitute the largest number of representatives. Its functions are to discuss the university's strategic lines and objectives, discuss the aspects that affect the careers of academic and management staff, voice its opinion regarding the appointment of the rector, and discuss any other matters proposed by the rector, the Governing Council or the Executive Board.

Student Council

The Student Council is the students' highest representative, consultative and advisory body. It includes student representatives from all faculty committees. The Student Council is part of the University Council.

Faculty committees

Faculty committees channel student participation in the ordinary operation of the university's faculties. The representatives are responsible for forwarding students' demands to the relevant bodies.

Transforming the Network of UOC Centres

With the support of the Office of the Vice Rector for Competitiveness and Employability and thanks to the digitalization of student support processes, the Network of UOC Centres has established itself as a fundamental tool for transferring the UOC's social, academic and research impact to the region. This transformation process began in 2021 and has been successfully completed, allowing for better interaction and cooperation between the university and local communities.

The mission of the Network of UOC Centres is specified in **three key areas**:

1) Establish and maintain relationships with alliances in the region to promote cooperation and joint development.

2) Collect information on regions' needs to adapt the university's academic and research catalogue to them.

3) Facilitate links between the UOC and the region to apply research results and expertise to local development.

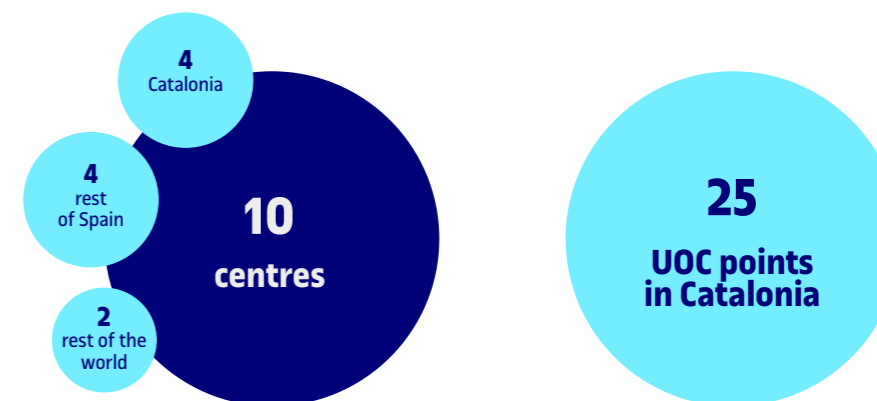
During the current academic year, the Network of UOC Centres has continued to work on these three key areas, establishing alliances and signing more than 130 new agreements with companies, government bodies, and professional and other associations. These agreements aim to promote people's professional development and increase the competitiveness of the manufacturing sector, both in Catalonia and in the rest of Spain. Through these alliances, it seeks to generate synergies between the university and the business fabric in order to promote knowledge transfer and innovation.

The third Skills cycle and the Retos cycle have now been completed. These cycles have served to maintain our commitment to offer activities designed both to improve the employability of our university community and to disseminate the knowledge generated by the UOC.

Also noteworthy are the fifth Almanzora Comparte hackathon in Almeria, the launch of the SmartSME cycle in Alicante and the involvement of all regional centres in the UOC Rural project. These are good examples of the UOC's outreach throughout the country.

Through these activities and initiatives, the UOC seeks not only to train its students and improve their skills, but also to disseminate the knowledge generated by the university and promote its impact on the region. This translates into an active presence and involvement in projects and events that foster local development, innovation and cooperation with stakeholders in the region.

Sharing knowledge to multiply social impact



The UOC's vision of the future is shaped by its ambition to transform higher education in the digital age. This is rooted in its firm belief that universities must assume a more strategic role and achieve greater social impact by acting as hubs that share knowledge amongst society's different actors.



A webinar on artificial intelligence was held in June. Mike Sharples, Emeritus Professor of Educational Technology at the Open University Institute of Educational Technology, introduced his audience to the latest developments in the field of educational technology and innovation.

Sharing learning: experiences in the digital transformation of education

Digital transformation in higher education, digital ecosystems, the use of technology in learning and e-learning are terms that have gained great importance in recent years. Educational institutions and governments have seen the need to change or adapt their learning models to promote more flexible pedagogical schemes without losing educational quality.

This year the UOC has launched the **Sharing Learning** project to pool the knowledge and experience we have acquired, and to provide strategic and operational solutions for institutions facing the uncertainties and questions that typically arise during processes of change, improvement and reflection on digital formats and the use of technology in higher education.

People, as the main protagonists, who must be committed, promote the cultural and organizational change within their organizations, and learn digital skills.



Technology, as a means of facilitating educational and management processes, collecting, analysing and using the data provided by student activity, as well as incorporating emerging technologies applicable to education.



Management and academic processes, always making students' interests the ultimate goal, making decisions in favour of students and always thinking about optimizing operations to improve internal and external services.



Comprehensive communication management, as a key strategy to overcome resistance to change and maintain flexible, clear and fluid communication internally and externally, using the different channels provided for this purpose.



The inaugural lecture

Michael Murphy, a doctor by profession and President of the European University Association (EUA) since 2019, opened the 2022/2023 academic year with the inaugural lecture "Universities Without Walls. Adapting to Change in Europe".

The lecture could be followed online on Monday, October 17, at 7 p.m. The inaugural lecture was recorded on 4 October and was attended by UOC Rector Josep A. Planell; the President of the UOC's Board of Trustees, Pere Vallès, and the then Minister for Research and Universities of the Government of Catalonia, Gemma Geis. On 10 October Geis left that role and was replaced as Minister for Research and Universities by Joaquim Nadal i Farreras the following day.

Professor Murphy's speech focused on the future, and he presented the keys to the document "Universities without walls. A vision for 2030", designed to support European universities over the next decade in the face of the multiple challenges they face, including climate change, digitalization, demographic changes, social polarization and geopolitical realignments.

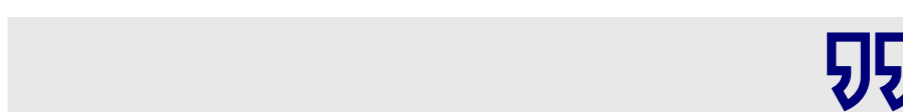
Diversity, key to minimizing the risks of artificial intelligence

Wendy Hall, awarded an honorary doctorate

Dame Wendy Hall, doctor in Mathematics and Regius Professor of Computer Science, was awarded an honorary doctorate by the UOC in recognition of her academic career in the fields of artificial intelligence, the semantic web and web science, her inclusive vision of technology as a resource for people's well-being, and her leading role in the fight for gender equality and against horizontal segregation in the field of technology. The then rector of the UOC, Josep A. Planell, presided over a ceremony in which the director of the Internet Interdisciplinary Institute (IN3), David Megías, and the dean of the Faculty of Computer Science, Multimedia and Telecommunications, Daniel Riera, also participated.

Professor Hall reviewed her academic and professional career, as well as some of the challenges she has faced. The first, she said, was gender inequality: "I wanted to study medicine, but my headmistress wouldn't let me. This was 1969, and she told me medicine was not a career for women." That was how she started a career in mathematics, which she refers to as "my natural skill", just on the cusp of the computer revolution. "I hated computers at university," she laughingly confessed, admitting that she reluctantly studied programming. But, despite never having enjoyed programming, she explained how, thanks to having studied

a doctorate purely in mathematics, she learned to think abstractly, and she later applied this skill to computing. "A lot of computer scientists get very deep in the detail of programming, and they don't look at the big picture. Part of my skill is that I understand enough to know what we can do today, but I abstract out of it to think about where this might lead us tomorrow."

Hall concluded her speech with a look to the future. Marking the fiftieth anniversary of the internet in 2024, the professor pointed out that we need to think about the next fifty years. "The future of the internet and the future of the world with artificial intelligence are completely intertwined," she said, and pointed out that her thoughts on the geopolitics of the internet also hold true for AI. "How governments regulate artificial intelligence will completely determine our future, and this regulation will be very different from that of the United States, Europe, China and other emerging nations." According to Hall, "We desperately need diversity: we need interdisciplinary skills and expertise, and those are two of the things that I see flourishing here at the UOC."

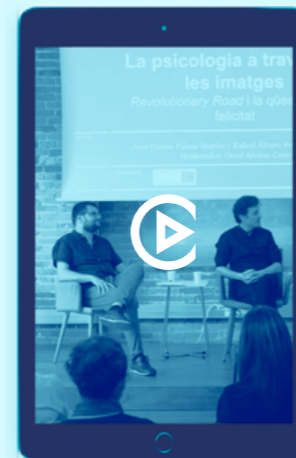

Our goal is to provide lifelong learning opportunities for everyone, regardless of their circumstances. We are now more committed to this goal than ever. And through high-quality e-learning we can contribute to Sustainable Development Goal 4, Quality Education.

The UOC in Latin America

From 6 to 14 October, the rector, Josep A. Planell, travelled to Ecuador, Colombia and Uruguay to meet in person representatives of the governments and educational institutions with which the UOC has partnerships related to various projects and initiatives. He also met members of the UOC community in Colombia and Ecuador, which are home to 63% of the university's Latin American students.

To strengthen university systems and improve access to and coverage of quality online higher education for everyone: these are the UOC's missions in Latin America. To this end, the university partners with ministries and secretariats of education, quality agencies and university networks. It also fosters the digital transformation of universities, mentoring higher education institutions in the process of implementing quality online education.

The UOC was one of the co-organizers of the event, with the twelve Catalan universities that are part of the ApS(U)CAT network. Under the slogan "Impacta!", it analysed the network's influence on all the agents involved: organizations and community, students, teaching staff and the university as an institution. Impact and assessment were the key concepts of the conference, which aimed to take stock of the network's impact on these groups.

International consortium to rethink vocational training in the digital environment

The UOC is participating in the Erasmus+ Deal with Digital Work-Based Learning (D-WBL) project, a new international consortium that brings together eight partners from five European countries, including universities, companies and vocational training centres, with the aim of improving learning experiences based on digital tools and making them more accessible. The three-year initiative will culminate in a best practice guide and the design of an innovative online course to help vocational training teachers use more effective pedagogical approaches and design experiences for this type of course.

Commitment to equal opportunities

The UOC reinforces its commitment to equal opportunities, both in terms of access to training throughout the region and measures to raise awareness, provide information and training on gender, sexual diversity, and equal opportunities between women and men.

Launch of Equity Labs: a cycle to talk about equity and equal opportunities

The UOC launched a new series of lectures and discussions on concepts such as equity and equal opportunities, with the participation of professors and expert professionals who present their strategies and best practice in the organizations where they work. Two conferences were held in 2023, focusing on equity and disability, thanks to an agreement signed with the Randstad Foundation (a strategic ally of the UOC since 2017 regarding care for students with disabilities), and with the support of Nestlé. The first was in May, discussing how to promote a culture of diversity management in companies.

Bridging the gap between town and country

This year, the UOC opened a call for applications for 100 grants for residents in municipalities of under 2,000 inhabitants, with the aim of helping to reduce the gap between regions and make rural communities more resilient through training activities that stimulate the generation of specialized knowledge in different regional centres. These grants will allow us to create networks of cooperation, knowledge exchange and good practice that lead to better and greater social capital, mitigating and, if possible, reversing the gradual decline in rural populations, a phenomenon that affects an increasing number of locations: according to the Bank of Spain's 2020 annual report, 42% of Spanish municipalities are in danger of depopulation.

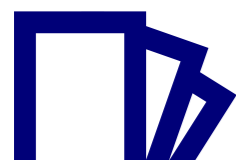


First LGBTIQ+ Pride Research Conference: A Future with a Long History

UOC O2 Repository

The UOC's [O2 repository](#) is the portal that collects, disseminates and preserves the digital publications produced by the UOC community in its teaching, research and management activities. It contributes to the dissemination of the knowledge generated in the institution, increases its impact and ensures its preservation.

The UOC's O2 repository facilitates the self-archiving of publications, including both the scientific output of research staff (scientific articles, for example), students' final projects and the

university's institutional documents. It also enables open educational resources (OERs) to be deposited.

At the end of the 2022/2023 academic year, when the UOC's [Open Knowledge Action Plan](#) had been in place for four years, 18,975 documents were available. During the academic year, several technical improvements were made to the repository's indexing, visibility and SEO.

Committed to open science

The UOC is part of the Spanish University Libraries Network (REBIUN) repositories group and open access group. It participates in the evaluation of institutional repositories ([REBIUN-FECYT Guide](#)), the production of [repository statistics](#) and the monitoring of [transformative agreements](#).

The UOC's open science is viewable in the [CORA](#) consortium portal, which allows access to the [data](#) produced in its research activity, [data management plans](#), the [doctoral theses](#) defended by students, and all the data on research at the UOC in the [Catalan Research Portal](#) (PRC).

At the end of 2022, the UOC, in accordance with its Open Knowledge Action Plan, committed itself to the Coalition for Advancing Research Assessment (CoARA), and began work on drafting the Action plan for the reform of research assessment (2024-2027), consulting researchers via a questionnaire based on the DORA SPACE rubric.

Chairs

The university's chairs carry out training, research, and technological and knowledge transfer projects to generate and exchange knowledge in a specific field.

UNESCO Chair in Education and Technology for Social Change

It was created in 2002 to promote research, learning, information and documentation about the intensive use of ICT in education.

UNESCO Chair on Food, Culture and Development

It aims to promote research and education in three main areas: food, culture (including knowledge, social diversity and different local adaptations) and development.

UOC-COCEMFE Chair in Personal Autonomy and Digital Health

Its purpose is to research, innovate and transfer knowledge about personal autonomy and its relationship with digital health. Activities are carried out according to the "P4 medicine" paradigm: personalized, predictive, participatory and preventive.

Barcelona UOC Chair in Digital Economy

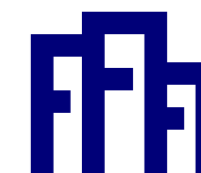
Its mission is to promote strategic measures, connections, work dynamics and instruments to encourage public policies and the ecosystem of cities to face the challenges of the platform economy.

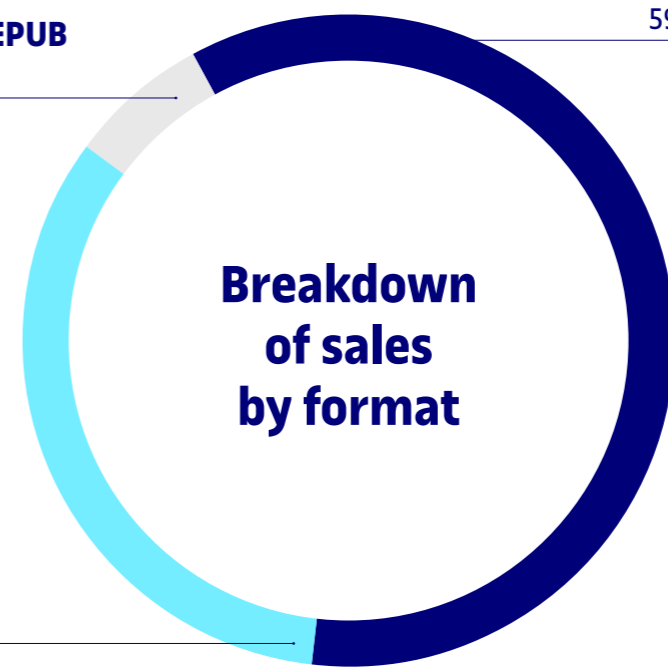
During the academic year, sales in digital format were consolidated and communication was professionalized with the incorporation of a communication agency to manage social networks.

The inauguration of the R&I Hub in the media

The inauguration of the Interdisciplinary R&I Hub in October was also publicized in the media, making a strong impact with forty items published. The video about the Hub, published on YouTube, in three languages, accumulated more than 1,300 views during 2022. The event led to a growth in conversation generated in networks, both our own and that of outsiders. It grew by more than 700%, with reach and impressions rising by around 1,000%. Twitter (now X) is the network where most content was generated, followed by Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn.

Of the institutional activities that we have featured on social networks, the five with the greatest impact were the graduation ceremonies, the Virtual Employment Fair, the call for affiliated teaching staff, the inauguration of the interdisciplinary R&I Hub and the UOC2TheFuture Innovation Fair.

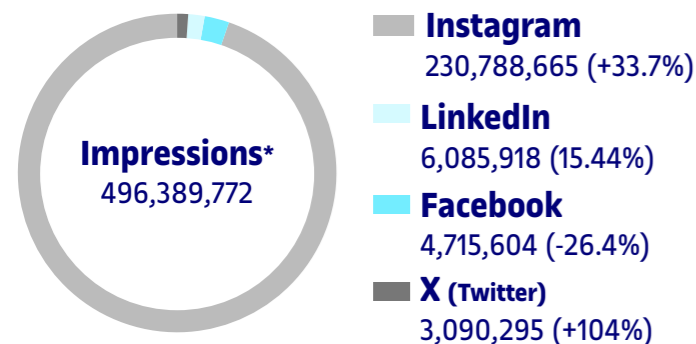

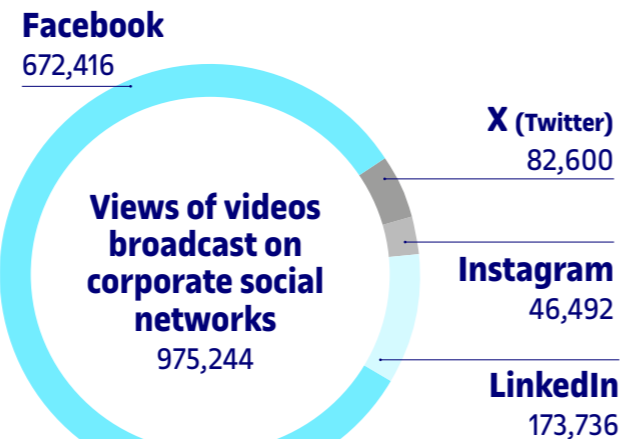

The new version of *La UOC en viu!* ran for an average of more than 27 minutes of live views. The metrics indicate that the impact of this programme, which focuses on the New Way of Working and is presented by members of our staff, was high, as it reached practically the entire organization with an increase in the audience following it.

In the summer edition of the programme about twenty members of staff appeared as presenters or interviewees. 327 viewers watched it live for more than 31 minutes on average, four minutes longer than the previous programme.

More than twenty of our colleagues participated in the programme and on the day of the broadcast it accumulated 421 views, with a peak of 200 simultaneous users and an average viewing time of 35 minutes.

The UOC campus is growing

This academic year, an agreement has been signed to facilitate the creation of a single UOC campus and expand the facilities of the Institute of Photonic Sciences (ICFO) in Castelldefels.

The building occupied by the UOC in the Mediterranean Technology Park in Castelldefels was transferred to the ICFO, while Barcelona Activa, Barcelona City Council's local economic development agency, which was using the ground and second floors of the Can Jaumandreu building, vacated these premises to leave more room for the UOC. Barcelona City Council is enabling the university to carry out all its academic, research and management activities on a single campus in the city's technology and knowledge district.

This academic year we opened the campus comprising three buildings in Poble Nou, now with new names.

U Building

The historic building of Can Jaumandreu is now called the *U Building*, referring to the *u* of *university*.

O Building

The O building is used mostly for teaching, and is the university's original building.

C Building

The **C Building is the research building**, where the new Interdisciplinary R&I Hub is located.



Transforming the corporate learning model

This year, the Personnel department rolled out a new corporate learning environment for staff, in response to one of the needs defined in the Talent Plan (Be UOC area) of the 2022-2025 Strategic Plan. @AteneaAcademy is the new platform that transforms the UOC's corporate learning

model, by means of an environment that facilitates training and the development of in-house talent. The platform was created with Canvas, the cutting-edge technology we have already used to develop the learning environment in the classroom.

Winter and summer meetings

In December, the rector, Josep A. Planell, invited staff to the traditional Christmas chocolate party, to informally review the year's work and wish everyone a happy holiday. The event brought together more than 350 people and, as usual, served to pay tribute to colleagues and friends who, after a long career at the UOC, have retired this year.

A few months later, in July, almost 400 people attended the summer gathering, an opportunity to spend some time together on the UOC campus. During the event, Àngels Fitó

addressed a few words to all staff, thanking them for their work in the academic year and the commitment they had shown in a year of great challenges. The afternoon brought some surprises, with a new broadcast of our live programme *La UOC en viu!* and the exclusive opening of the university's new merchandise store, which will be operational next academic year.



Emotional Well-Being Health Week

In November 2022 we marked Emotional Well-Being Health Week with 13 activities, including talks and workshops dealing with different aspects of well-being, and seven podcasts in which all the UOC faculties participated, discussing topics related to emotional well-being.

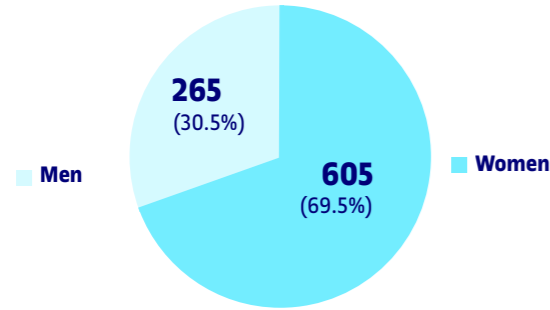
Urban Mobility Challenge

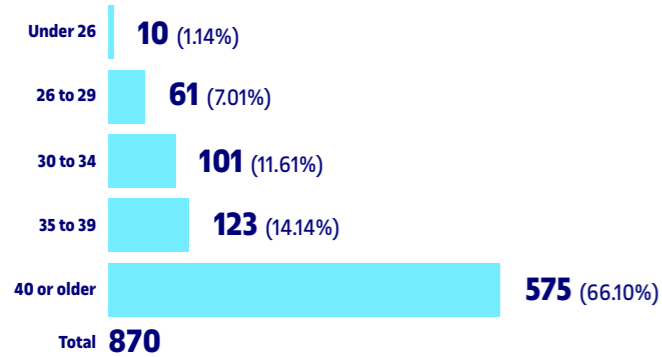
Teaching, research and administrative staff

Administrative staff by age



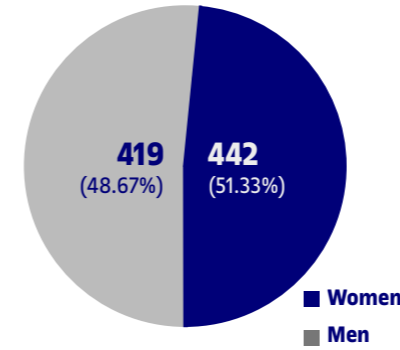

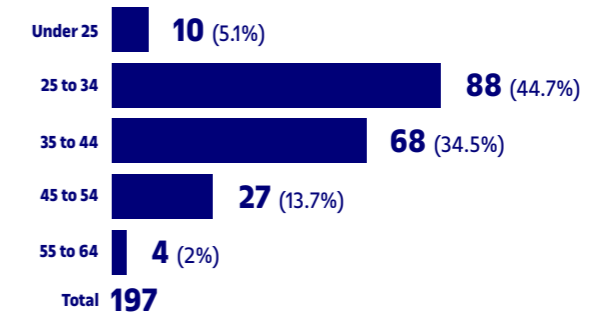

Awards, recognition and rankings

In the 2nd group of the best young universities in Spain

Young University Ranking 2023
Times Higher Education

In its 2023 Young University Ranking, the *Times Higher Education* magazine analysed universities less than fifty years old around the world. This year, the UOC achieved excellent results and climbed four places in the Spanish ranking: a year ago it was in the 6th bracket, this year it was in the 2nd, together with Ramon Llull University and the University of Vic – Central University of Catalonia, behind only Pompeu Fabra University (18th in the Young University Ranking). In the world ranking, the UOC is in the 101-150 bracket.

The world's best Spanish-language online MBA for five years in a row

Hamilton Global Intelligence Ranking of Higher Online Education

The UOC Executive MBA is the world's top Spanish-language online MBA, according to the 2022 ranking of online higher education institutions (FSO Ranking) produced by Hamilton Global Intelligence together with Emagister. Over 200 institutions from 30 countries were analysed. Some 4,000 students and graduates were surveyed.

The UOC improves its international standing, according to the CYD ranking

2023 Conocimiento y Desarrollo (CYD) Foundation

The UOC's indicators for international outlook increased twofold, and it gained one for research, according to the 2023 CYD Ranking, which rates the performance of Spanish universities. The UOC recorded a total of 36 indicators. In this year's ranking it doubled its high score in international outlook and improved its position in terms of research compared to 2022. Once again, the UOC is Spain's top-ranked online university.

For the fifth time, the UOC appeared in the *Times Higher Education (THE)* list of the world's best universities, with an improved ranking. The *THE* ranking placed the UOC in the 501-600 bracket of the 1,799 institutions around the world analysed this year. Last time, the UOC was in the 601-800 bracket. The UOC is now ranked among the top ten universities in Spain.

The UOC was awarded the Haz Foundation's T*** distinction, the highest level of its "T for Transparency" seal, for its Transparency portal. This seal is based on indicators of transparency and good governance of private universities, which must meet the criteria for visibility, accessibility, and up-to-date and complete information. The UOC achieved 100% of the indicators.

Aïna Fuster-Casanovas, a predoctoral researcher on the Health and Psychology PhD programme, was awarded first prize in the best Twitter thread category of the InnoBages Awards, organized by the Bages regional authority for the promotion of scientific dissemination on social media.

Most Influential Paper Award

Jordi Cabot, ICREA research professor and leader of the IN3 SOM Research Lab group, was given the Most Influential Paper Award at the 30th IEEE International Requirements Engineering Conference (2022).

Academic quality distinction

F. Xavier Medina, a member of the Faculty of Health Sciences, received an academic quality distinction for the article "La construcción del patrimonio cultural inmaterial de carácter alimentario y sus retos en el área mediterránea: el caso de la dieta mediterránea", awarded by the journal *Rivar*.

Literati Award 2022

Faculty of Arts and Humanities member Alba Colombo was honoured, as co-author, with the 2022 Literati Award from the *International Journal of Event and Festival Management*, for the article "Staging city events in public spaces: an urban design perspective".

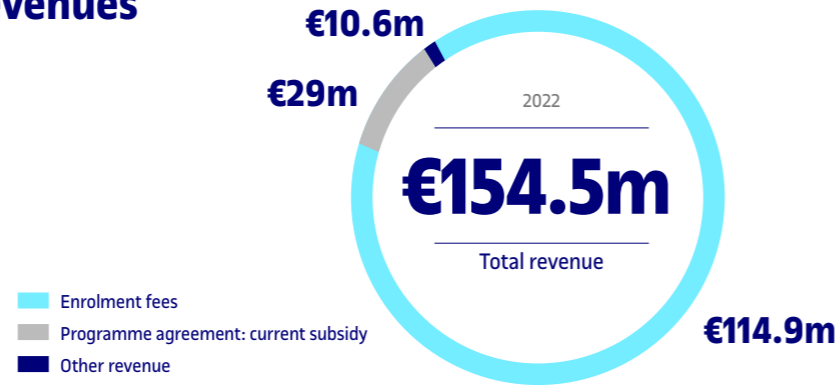

Financial summary

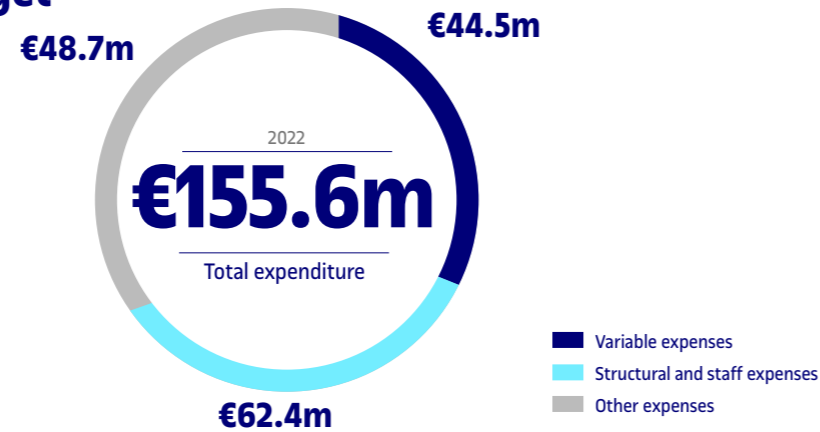
Total revenue in 2022 was €161m, with operating revenues up by 2% compared with the previous year, 98% of the initial forecast for the year. The programme agreement subsidy increased thanks to additional current transfers linked to a change in the remuneration policy for teaching staff and to offset the reduction in public university fees, impacting staff costs and enrolment fees, respectively.

The UOC reported a deficit for 2022 similar to that forecast, offset by bringing forward part of the surplus from 2020 and 2021 with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

Revenues



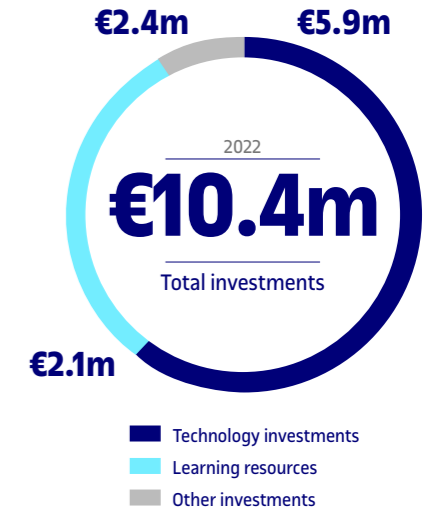

This page shows the key figures included in the 2023 budget and the changes compared with the actual figures for 2022.

The university's budget has increased by more than 50% since 2014 reflecting the institution's sustained growth. The UOC's budget over the last two years has exceeded €150m.

As in 2022, expenses exceed revenue in the 2023 budget, which will be offset by bringing forward the surplus generated in 2020 and 2022.

The current revenue in the approved budget for 2023 totals €161m, of which €118.5m correspond to enrolment fees (up 3.1%, a much lower growth rate than in previous years, which saw double-digit growth), €29.9m correspond to the programme agreement and €12.6m to other revenues. The subsidy accounts for 18.7% of the total budget.

The investment budget for 2023 is €9.7m. Of this, €2.4m are earmarked for updating learning resources and €5.9m for technology. These investments will enable the UOC to continue the process of transforming courses and implementing the new Information Systems Master Plan.

The new executive team

Àngels Fitó, rector of the UOC, appointed her executive team on 14 April, the day after she took office. During the event, which was attended by members of the University Council, the appointments were signed and the university's silver insignia were awarded.

What is the role of the vice rectors?

The rector is assisted by a number of vice rectors, whose exact number she decides. Their appointment, the assignment of their responsibilities, in accordance with the provisions of the university's Organizational and Operational Regulations, and their dismissal depend on the rector.

The vice rectors are full members of the university's most important bodies: the Governing Council, the Executive Board and the Academic Committee.

There will, therefore, be four new vice rectors:



Vice Rector for Teaching and Learning

Teresa Guasch has a PhD in Psychology from Ramon Llull University (2003) and a degree in Psychopedagogy. She holds postgraduate degrees in Psychopedagogical Attention to School Diversity (UAB, 1997) and Curricular Counselling in the Field of Teaching and Learning Strategies (joint: URL, UAB and UOC, 1999). She has been dean of the Faculty of Psychology and Education Sciences since 2014 and is a senior lecturer at the UOC. Her research and innovation work focuses on the study of teaching and learning processes in virtual environments, from a psychoeducational perspective.



Vice Rector for Research, Knowledge Transfer and Entrepreneurship

Xavier Vilajosana, who has a PhD in Computer Science from the UOC and the UPC, is a full professor and lead researcher in the IN3 Wireless Networks (WiNE) group. He has recently been appointed ICREA Acadèmia researcher. He has developed 32 patents, 26 of which are exploited by multinational companies, and has participated in the creation of various start-ups.



Vice Rector for Governance and Academic Policy

M. Jesús Martínez-Argüelles has a PhD in Economics and Business Studies from the University of Barcelona. She also holds a master's degree in Industrial Quality from UNED and a master's degree in Science in Economics from Pompeu Fabra University. She has been dean of the Faculty of Economics and Business since 2019. Previously, she was a lecturer in the same department (2000 to 2019) and an associate professor in the field of business organization (2008 to 2019), as well as being the associate dean for teaching (2016 to 2019).



Vice Rector for Alliances, Community and Culture

Manel Jiménez-Morales has been a professor of Communication at Pompeu Fabra University (UPF) since 2000. He has a PhD in Social Communication from the same university, a master's degree in Advanced Studies in the same field and degrees in Audiovisual Communication (UPF) and Theory of Literature and Comparative Literature (UB). He has also been a visiting professor in the Department of Literature at the University of Oxford, and in the Department of Theatre, Film and Television at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), and has worked as a researcher at the British Film Institute, London. Until 2023 he was Vice Rector for Educational Transformation, Culture and Communication at UPF and a member of the strategic committee of the European University Association.

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
